

People are dependent on other people for survival, emotional wellbeing and a range of other basic needs. Mutual aid is a term for when individuals or entire communities work together to provide that support. Using personal skills and resources to give assistance allows for a pooled network of support.

Talk with your child about how your family could provide support to people in need or the community as a whole. You can start small with the things you are passionate about or go big and develop a mutual aid network in your neighborhood, apartment building, or group of friends. Here are a few ideas to get you going:

#### Start with what you love

Is your child really into bugs? Support pollinators by potting bee-friendly plants in your backyard. Any messy play lovers in your house? Help your neighbor with garden work this summer. Is there a teen on your couch who is constantly on a gadget? Check in with your neighbors to see if they could use assistance setting up vaccine appointments.

## Give thanks

Work with your children to write thank you letters to those who helped out when times were tough. You can thank a delivery driver, a grocery store clerk, a librarian or that neighbor who let you borrow a shovel that one time. Use the coloring page at the end of this guide to get young kids involved.

### Plan with your pod

Create a mutual aid pod – a small network of individuals – and start the conversation by discussing hobbies, schedules and needs. Assistance will ebb and flow over time and your pod will have its own unique experience. Some examples of mutual aid pod projects include:

- · Community aid fund to support financial hardships
- $\cdot$  Snow shoveling, yard work, dog walking or tool sharing programs
- · Neighborhood kindness kit creation
