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About the Grading System

To best project NFL success for these prospects we looked at various historical data points from successful fantasy football QB, RB, WR, and TE. What did Patrick Mahomes and Kyler Murray have in common? What was George Kittle's speed score compared to Travis Kelce's? Etc... Through this analysis, we found 12 factors that correlated to a QB's success, five for RBs, five for WRs, and 10 for TEs. Once the categories were identified, we placed groups of outputs together. The scoring was then tiered to match historical output. After these factors were identified, we looked at which factor correlated the most to success and which was the least and weighted the scores on a scale of .1% to 100%.

After the data is entered.... BAM! We got a score for a prospect.

Player Bio:

A storybook career ended with a resounding defeat in the college football playoffs. Book, who is Notre Dame's winningest QB in program history (30), is a classic talented college QB who found success despite his size. Only listed at 6', Book posted some solid rushing numbers, topping out at 546 yards. In his last two seasons at Notre Dame he ran for 13 TDs, proving his dual threat ability.

Bottom Line:

Book will forever be remembered in Notre Dame and college football history as an elite winner. Winning, while important, isn't necessarily an indicator of NFL success. Unfortunately for Book, his size and below average arm strength will keep him from becoming an every week starter in the NFL, but has the looks to be a competent and quality QB2 for an NFL team.

Ehlinger was a four year starter for the Longhorns and sits 4th all time in wins for QBs. Ehlinger is a non-traditionally built QB, measuring under 6'3" tall. Ehlinger has serious question marks surrounding him as he enters the NFL Draft. Can he play QB in the NFL?

Bottom Line:

Ehlinger had a phenomenal storybook career for the Longhorns at QB. Unfortunately, his best days at the position are behind him. Ehlinger does not have the arm strength to play the position in the NFL, and coupled with his inability to process a full field, I think Ehlinger may develop into a Taysom Hill type role for an NFL team. Think the Taysom Hill role but with far less passing attempts. Ehlinger is a charismatic leader who will lift any locker room he is in, and his determination and effort will land him on a 53 man roster as a do-it-all Swiss Army knife, gadget player. I doubt Ehlinger makes an impact for fantasy football rosters.

Player Bio:

Justin Fields certainly had a non-traditional career for one of the highest-rated recruits of all-time. After committing to Georgia and losing the starting job to Jake Fromm, Fields decided to transfer to Ohio State to introduce a new scheme under newly-hired head coach Ryan Day. His transfer virtually guaranteed his starting spot, and Fields didn't take that lightly. As a true sophomore, Justin Fields finished with 2,953 yards, 40 touchdowns, 1 interception, and a QBR of 92.1. He followed that with 2,100 yards, 22 touchdowns, 6 interceptions, and a QBR of 91.7 in a COVID-19 shortened season.

Positives:



- Elite ball placement
- Arm talent
- Ability to extend with his legs; advanced as a ball carrier
- Worked in a largely pro-style offense with advanced reads & WR route trees
- Advanced footwork

Negatives:



- Eye speed and play clock are sometimes slow
- Tries to play hero ball and make the big play instead of hitting his check down
- Fails to trust his arm and eyes at times

Bottom Line:

Justin Fields is getting overlooked in a class that includes Trevor Lawrence, Zach Wilson, and Trey Lance. For fantasy, Justin Fields has what could be the highest ceiling and certainly the highest floor. While Fields relied less on his legs than Trevor Lawrence, he certainly is more dynamic as a rusher. His elite accuracy should make the transition to the NFL a little easier, and while there's a decent chance Fields doesn't start Week 1 (depending on landing spot), he may just be the most valuable dynasty asset in the 2021 draft class.

Player Bio:

After waiting his turn behind Jalen Hurts and Tua Tagovailoa, Jones showed up and showed out in 2020. Jones, a Heisman finalist, was able to lead the Crimson Tide to the National Championship behind superb cerebral play. The stats were nice too. Generally ranked around the QB5 in the 2021 class, Jones leaves much to be desired in the athleticism category, but can process and interpret defenses at an elite level. Jones has a shot to be a first round pick in the 2021 NFL Draft.

Bottom Line:

Jones has the brains to be a starting NFL QB. Sure, his supporting cast was elite at Alabama, but we didn't knock Tua or Hurts for that. I worry that Jones lacks the arm strength at the NFL level to zip passes into tight windows, but he can still heave the rock quite a bit. If Jones ends up in the right spot, in the right offense, he could be a quality NFL starting QB.

Player Bio:

Lance has limited experience as a starter, but he was electric in those opportunities. The NDSU QB played just two games in his freshman season, attempting just one pass and accumulating 8/82/2 on the ground. Essentially, we are only looking at Lance's sophomore campaign for scouting purposes. Lance dominated the FCS ranks, notching nearly 4,000 total yards, 42 total TDs, and claiming another FCS Championship for the Bison in 2019. The Bison hyper-utilized Lance's abilities as a ball carrier giving him 169 rushes for 1100 yards and 14 TDs. Lance is a very talented runner and will likely use this skillset in a smaller fashion at the next level.

Positives:



- Arm talent
- Beautiful deep ball
- Takes care of the football
- Immense potential

Negatives:



- Struggles on touch passes
- Accuracy needs improvement
- Decides to run prematurely

Bottom Line:

Trey Lance is a top-notch developmental prospect that will work his way into a starting role in the NFL. I would love to see him land on a team with a veteran presence in the QB room and a crafty, nuanced OC who can use Lance's potential as a runner. Lance is currently my QB3 in the 2021 class and landing spot will drastically help his stock. He and BYU's Zach Wilson are neck and neck. I expect Lance to take his rookie as a learning experience and really learn the in's and out's of his offense. Look out for Trey Lance to take the NFL by storm in 2022!

Player Bio:

As a five-star recruit out of high school and 247Sports top overall player in the 2018 class, Trevor Lawrence had his pick of schools coming out of high school after breaking Deshaun Watson's Georgia state record for career passing yards and touchdowns. Lawrence excelled immediately at Clemson, winning a national title with the Tigers as a true freshman with an undefeated record in 2018. From there, he progressed in nearly every statistical category over the course of his three years at Death Valley. Lawrence's 90:17 career TD-to-INT ratio speaks volumes about his accuracy and arm talent, but don't forget about his ability to carve up college linebackers in the rushing game. He hit pay dirt 18 times in his college career with his legs.

Positives:



- Arm strength
- Excellent awareness and mobility in the pocket
- Ability to diagnosis blitz packages and make the appropriate read
- Underrated rushing upside and speed

Negatives:



- Will occasionally lock onto his first read
- Tendency to overthrow
- Forces throws when out of the pocket

Bottom Line:

Trevor Lawrence is easily the most pro ready QB in the 2021 class and is a virtual lock to go #1 overall to the Jacksonville Jaguars. He's got the physical tools and the processing speed/football IQ to be able to succeed right away. And when things don't go right and there's chaos in the pocket, Lawrence's mobility and speed can help pad the stat line via the rushing game. Lawrence is locked into the QB1 slot in this class for both real life NFL purposes and dynasty purposes on my board.

Kellen Mond will go down in Texas A&M history as a legend. Mond leaves College Station after being a four year starter and sits atop the prestigious schools All Time lists for: offensive yards, passing yards, passing TDs, completions and pass attempts. Remember, this is a school that sent first round QBs Ryan Tannehill and Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Manziel into the NFL. Tannehill is a solid NFL QB and who knows what Manziel could have done in the NFL without his off-field issues. How does Mond have all these records for the Aggies? Is Mond a diamond in the rough?

Bottom Line:

Mond will go down as one of the statistically great QBs the country has seen. Unfortunately, this doesn't mean Mond will find success at the NFL level. Yes, he's A&M's all time leader in a bunch of categories, but this is due largely to his four year starting career and the wide open nature of the SEC. Mond is streaky. He will play lights out for a quarter, looking like an NFL starter, and then the next two quarters he leaves you wondering if he can even make a roster. Although Mond has some good rushing numbers, he isn't overly athletic to where his legs can be a weapon, but it's enough to get himself out of bad situations. He looks like a developmental backup with upside to make a career as a journeyman backup.

As a Bulldog fan, I was bummed I didn't get to see Newman operate the offense in Athens. After waiting his turn at Wake Forest, Newman broke out in his first full season as a starter in 2019. Newman elected to graduate transfer to UGA and ultimately did not play, electing to opt out and focus on his draft preparation. He received an invite to the Senior Bowl and had mixed reviews. The athleticism is there, which can bail him out of making some poor decisions with the football.

Bottom Line:

Newman could have really helped his draft stock by putting together a solid year for UGA. I respect his decision to opt out but I do not think his draft stock increased from his Wake Forest days. The athletic upside of Newman and his ability to move the chains with his legs intrigues me, and I think the NFL will feel the same way. Newman isn't highly regarded in this 2021 class, but he could be a project with upside for some NFL teams.

Quarterback Kyle Trask had a monster breakout season in 2020 for the Florida Gators. Kyle led the nation in passing TDs with a total of 43 touchdowns and was #2 in passing yards with a total of 4,283. Bottom Line:

Kyle Trask's monstrous numbers in 2020 should be attributed to the skill group the Florida Gators had which was led by top NFL Tight End prospect Kyle Pitts and Wide Receivers Kadarius Toney & Trevon Grimes. At times often more than less, Kyle locks on to his primary read with an all or nothing approach which forced him to throw into coverage. Consistently locking on to your primary read at the Pro level will not go over well as NFL Defenses and Coordinators will pick up on the habit very quickly with film study. I have his professional career outlook as bench depth for an NFL roster who already has a Franchise QB and capable backup placing Kyle as the #3 QB on the roster.

Zach Wilson was the youngest QB to ever start a game for BYU. He started in 7 games his freshman year and played in 9. Wilson had shoulder surgery before his sophomore season on a labrum injury that had been plaguing him since high school. He was able to play his sophomore year and finished the season with 2,383 passing yards, 11 touchdowns, and 9 interceptions. Junior year Wilson exploded, leading the Cougars to a 11-1 record and finishing the season with 3,692 passing yards, 33 touchdowns, and 3 interceptions.

He became the third player in school history to top 100 rushing yards in their first game with 112 yards and two touchdowns against Hawaii. Kylin Hill's career at Mississippi State almost didn't happen. He actually quit his high school football team following his sophomore season. Luckily, he rejoined the team and wound up ranked as the No.2 player in the state and received 10 offers as a four-star recruit. Hill wasn't utilized much as a freshman and QB Nick Fitzgerald led the team in rushing during Hill's sophomore season. With Fitzgerald out of the picture in 2019, Hill had 1,350 rushing yards, the third-most in the SEC. Hill only played in three games in 2020 but finished with 58 rushing yards on 15 carries and 23 receptions for 237 yards and one touchdown as a receiver.

His skills as a receiver will help him be fantasy relevant, though, as a team's primary pass-catcher out of the backfield. Hill will likely find draft capital in the middle rounds of the NFL Draft. He's a decent flier in the third round of rookie drafts for dynasty gamers looking for a solid depth piece.

Rashod Bateman accumulated 147 catches, 2,395 yards and 19 touchdowns on 254 targets (31 games). Bateman and current Buccaneers WR Tyler Johnson formed a dynamic duo in Bateman's first two years at Minnesota. They dominated the Big Ten and helped the Gophers to an 11-2 record in 2019. Built like a Running back, Rodgers is a small but compact slot Wide Receiver who turned 77 receptions into 1020 yards and 4 TDs while becoming one of Clemson QB Trevor Lawrence's top targets in 2020.

His lack of athleticism makes it difficult to project him as anything more than a situational red zone play which limits his upside as a fantasy asset. The NFL game is quickly trending away from guys like this. We've seen players like J.J. Arcega-Whiteside, for example, struggle to carve out a role in a similar mold. There will be players with comparable production profiles but higher ceilings I'd rather take in the later rounds of dynasty rookie drafts.

McKitty, who was a preseason John Mackey Award watch list member, didn't produce much for the Bulldogs, only posting a 6/108/1 line. His best collegiate stat line came in 2018 where he posted a 26/256/2 line for the Seminoles. An adequate blocker, McKitty projects as a move TE in the NFL.
