## **HEAD OF MIDDLE SCHOOL (5-9)**

As we move towards the end of Term 1, it is important to recognise the continued great work of all Middle School students. We are now established in 2020 and it has been a real pleasure to watch the Middle School students get comfortable in their surrounds and thrive in all aspects of their schooling. With a number of programs initiated across the Middle School which sees students working together from Year 5 to Year 9— including a buddy program which pairs up students from different year levels—students have grown in confidence and allowed their learning opportunities to be maximised.

We have also enjoyed a number of experiences beyond the classroom in Middle School. Excursions, sports events and conferences have been attended, with more opportunities to come. The Year 7 students attended Chinatown last week as part of their Humanities program, where they immersed themselves in another culture. From all accounts it was a great experience that the students thoroughly enjoyed. Please enjoy some reviews of the excursion.

#### CHINESE CULTURE... AND FOOD!







"On Friday the Year 7s went to Chinatown to visit the Chinese museum and experience some Chinese food.

We left school in the morning on buses and we got dropped off near the Museum. Once we arrived we were separated into our homerooms. Two homerooms went into the museum and the other went outside to explore Chinatown. Our group was chosen to explore first and we went and visited the cottages dating back to the gold rush on Celestial Avenue. These cottages were lived in by the early migrants. Then we saw how the buildings were organised to be protected from evil spirits and learned that the lucky colour is red and gold (and white is unlucky!).

We then went into the museum and we saw a dragon that they use for a Chinese Lunar New Year and for Moomba. The body of the dragon requires 68 people to carry it and the head weighs 200kg! We went to a room which was dedicated to boats and the floor was moving like a ship rocking on the ocean. The museum visit was very interesting.

Then.... we ate! We went to the restaurant and had fried rice, lemon chicken, honey chicken and spring rolls. Most people tried to use chop sticks! The food was amazing - lemon chicken was a highlight! We then got a chance to hang out and some people went to the park and some went to the gift shop for a spot of shopping. Overall, we were very tired at the end of the day but we want to go back because it was awesome." Lucas Theuma, Kathrine Marasigan and Krystal Tran

"When we arrived at China Town we dropped our bags and went on a walking tour of Chinatown. We saw the unluckiest house on the street, a building sitting at the top of an intersection, it is unlucky because traditionally, in Chinese culture, people believe that evil spirits cannot turn corners and can only travel in a straight line, therefore they will always enter a building that is in front of a 'T' intersection. We also saw cooks hand making dumplings and learnt about how Chinatown was a bustling hub during the Gold Rush for Chinese merchants and potential gold miners about to travel to the gold fields." **Itai Levinger** 

"Overall, we had a great day learning all about the Chinese Dragons and the Han Dynasty. We loved walking down Celestial Avenue and exploring the museum. We think this experience has definitely enriched our learning in Humanities and has made us more curious about other cultures." **Dylan Vuu**

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"Once we finished exploring the bottom floors of the Chinese museum, we went upstairs to explore the inventions of Ancient China. One of the main inventions we saw was the Seismometer. This machine would drop a marble ball out of a dragon's head to indicate where earthquakes were arising from so that the emperor could evacuate his kingdom to safety. We also saw a suit made entirely of jade slabs tied together by copper wire. These were burial suits used when a Prince or Princess died. The body would be left in the sun to dry out before being mummified and laid into the suit. My group then watched a short documentary on the immigration from China to Australia. It showed how Chinese immigrants found it quite hard to acquire a job and education in Melbourne." Taylah Roberts

"When we got to the museum, we walked around the first floor/ground floor. While there, we saw and learned about Chinese dragons. The specific dragon we learnt about was the Millennium Dragon (made in the year 2000). From there, we headed downstairs to learn about how Chinese migrants used to travel to Australia during the gold rush period. We journeyed through a simulation of what it was like to travel on their boats: their bunk beds were extremely small and thin, and could barely fit a person. We then ventured on to see the display on how they used to mine gold. Once we moved on, we learnt about how Chinese people used to preserve food, they would preserve their food by drying it out in the sun, so all the water was evaporated. We then moved on to see how they used to build temples. The temples were small but had enough room to pray. Traditionally it is important that you enter a temple from the right side and exit from the left." Maddy Salomon-Best

## YEAR 12 STUDIO ARTS EXCURSION

On Thursday 5 March the Year 12 Studio Art students visited the National Gallery of Victoria. As a part of their Unit 3 studies, students need to be able to examine the practice of at least two artists with reference to two artworks by each artist. The world premiere exhibition presented the work of two of the most significant and influential artists of the late twentieth century: Jean-Michel Basquiat and Keith Haring.

Students focused on Jean-Michel Basquiat's artwork; his use of visual language through idiosyncratic imagery, radical ideas and complex socio-political commentary, and his indelible legacy that continues to influence contemporary visual and popular culture today. Students walked away inspired by his use of colour and erratic compositions—that somehow made sense. The day finished in the Queen Victoria gardens where students took photos for their folio as inspiration to explore their own ideas.

#### YEAR 12 PHYSICS EXCURSION

The Year 12 physics students attended the Vicphysics Teachers Network's organised physics activities at Luna Park last week. During the day the students carried out various measurements of quantities related to the operation of various rides and filled in relevant worksheets provided by the Vicphysics Teachers Network. This excursion allowed students to have fun while refining their scientific skills and witnessing physics in action.

## **Year 12 Physics Class Reflection**

For the first six weeks of this term the Unit 3/4 Physics class have been learning about motion; including the topics of circular motion, Newtons three laws, projectile and vertical motion. All the students in the physics class were excited when Mr Ram informed us that we would be going on an excursion to Luna Park to see real life examples of the topics we had covered inside the classroom.

During the excursion we were able to learn different physics concepts through practical examples, such as going on rides to explore the forces of motion. Apart from the thrill of going on all the rides, we also had worksheets and quizzes to do during the day to consolidate our learning. Overall, it was an engaging way to see real examples of physics in action and it also gave us the opportunity to liaise and share ideas with other physics students from other schools.
