Macoupin County Health Department Recommends Virtual Learning


Macoupin County, IL — The Macoupin County Health Department is reporting 'substantial' community transmission of COVID-19. To protect students, staff, and their families and slow the spread of COVID-19 in the community, the Health Department is recommending that public <u>and</u> private K-12 schools in Macoupin County transition to virtual "remote" learning.


We have been seeing 'substantial' community transmission of COVID-19 in Macoupin County for more than 7 consecutive days, with rates of new cases that we have not seen since the pandemic was declared. We continue to work closely with our school superintendents to equip them with data and tools to make informed decisions. Now the decision is up to school districts, to use their expertise and authority to make this difficult decision for the health and safety of their school communities and the greater Macoupin County community.


During the week of November 1st through November 7th, the average weekly incidence rate, or new case rate, in Macoupin County rose above 100 cases per 100,000 residents to an alarming rate of 457 cases. Since then, the rate has continued to rise, despite the target rate of less than 50 per 100,000. Our positivity rate has also risen to an alarming rate of 12.6%, with a target rate of less than 5%.

Macoupin County Detailed Metrics & School Metrics


Week 45: 11/1/2020 Through 11/7/2020







• Note that prior to the start of school in August, we were well underneath the 50 per 100 k per week Threshold. We now have reached a critical level of 457 per 100k per week Threshold.



Note that we have remained underneath the 8% test positivity rate until recently, which we are now resting at 12.6 % test positivity. The target is less than 5% overall.

School learning model recommendations are based on the weekly average daily incidence rate as follows:

- Substantial community transmission = >100 cases per 100,000 residents = Virtual "remote" learning model
- Moderate community transmission = ≥50 and ≤100 cases per 100,000 residents = Hybrid learning model
- Minimal community transmission = <50 cases per 100,000 residents = In-person learning model

The Health Department's recommendation will return to hybrid learning once the county returns to the 'moderate' level for 7 consecutive days. Under the plan, the Health Department is also monitoring COVID-19 testing turnaround time, which has been relatively stable since the summer.

The Macoupin County Health Department will collaboratively work with the Illinois Department of Public Health, Macoupin County schools and the Illinois State Board of Education to review, monitor, and discuss recommendations regarding the guidelines and metrics. The safety of our students, staff, and communities is always first and foremost. Keeping our schools open for in-person learning is a priority. However, if we want schools to reopen and remain open, we must all do our part. It is relatively easy if you wear a mask, keep your distance, and wash your hands frequently. These are challenging and unprecedented times, but with collective behaviors we can slow the spread and get our children back to in school learning.

We do not make this recommendation lightly. Schools are being asked to utilize virtual learning not because schools are the main driver of our new infections, but because the levels of community transmission warrant extra measures to keep our students, staff, and communities safe. Schools alone cannot bear this burden, therefore we must all take personal responsibility to keep this virus from spreading in any way that we can.
