Listening to an argument or statistics makes us a critic but listening to a story invites receptivity. Session goers will learn how to unleash the power of stories one video at a time through engagement and discussion.

Closing the Critical Thinking Gap: The Equity Case for Making Rigorous Learning Accessible to ALL Students Strand: Continuity of Learning

Brilliance is distributed equally. But too often, opportunity is not. The dual pandemics of COVID-19 pandemic and racial justice have given us the strongest possible case for prioritizing critical thinking instruction, but we still treat critical thinking as a luxury good. Equity requires educators to remove the systemic barriers far too many students face to unleashing their critical thinking potential. This workshop will give attendees a framework to leverage BIPOC students "because, not despite" assets that enhance rigorous learning opportunities; strategies to increase the cognitive load for all students; and practical but powerful tools to apply critical thinking frameworks seamlessly into a comprehensive instructional approach.

School culture is "built up as people solve problems, cope with tragedies, and celebrate successes" (The Shaping School Culture Fieldbook Second Edition, Peterson and Deal, 2009). Being forced into remote learning has led to an endless number of problems to be solved. Educators are grieving the loss of in-person traditions. And in the midst of it all, schools have been celebrating successes along the way. The disruption in school communities may have created an even stronger culture or may have created divides. Either way, schools can always benefit from a school culture jump Start. During this session educators will explore several keys to jump starting their school's culture, including assessing the culture you have, building relational trust, and setting aside time for reflection and celebration. Participants will acquire tips and tools that can be applied right away.

Why They Stay, Why They Leave -- Let's Ask Them! Strand: School Cultures

This presentation features Tony Simmons (Executive Director), Michael Lipset (Director of Social Impact), Joey Cienian (Education Program Director) and Amanda Galloway (Lead Advisor) of the High School for Recording Arts in St. Paul, MN. Collectively, Tony, Michael, Joey and Amanda conducted research over the course of the summer of 2020 to ask current and former students of the High School for Recording Arts about what caused them to leave their former schools, enroll at the High School for Recording Arts, and then either stay at the school through graduation or leave early. Results led to the identification of interpersonal press, or the idea that culturally sustaining interpersonal relationships must precede academic excellence when working in the high school reengagement space. This research project utilized youth participatory action research methodologies to center youth voices and establish rapport between researchers and participants. This presentation will center on this paper and explore the pull, push, and stick factors that stood out from this research. Then it will transition into a panel of Questions and Answers.

Media Relations and Strategic Communications Workshop Strand: Connecting with Community

Generating news coverage is becoming more challenging as news organizations shrink, reporters become more click-happy, competition for reduced news space intensifies, and to-do lists for school leaders lengthen. At the same time, while school leaders and others might think "we should be in the news more," they should consider how (or even whether!) news coverage is essential enough to their school's mission to justify the time, effort and opportunity cost. This session is designed to help independent charter school leaders:

- a) Learn more about how to think and act strategically about their media and other Communications;
- b) Understand how effective communications can fit into larger enrollment, fundraising, advocacy and other organizational goals;
- c) Gain insights into how the news media work and what motivates reporters and editors;
- d) Develop ideas on how to proactively seek media coverage as well as manage potentially negative news; and
- e) See how a strategic communications mindset can fit into their school's culture.

How a 7-Part Story Framework Boosted Student Applicants by 60% Strand: Connecting with Community

Many school leaders don't have a sustainable student recruitment plan and waste valuable time on last-ditch efforts rather than building a long term solution. In this workshop, Sawyer Schafbuch, who has spent the last five years helping charter schools recruit students, will teach you how to create a student recruitment funnel. The workshop will cover how to create a compelling brand message, how to make your website shine, how to gain and nurture leads, and how to use social media to drive applicants. When school leaders have an automated way to take families from clueless to committed, they can spend less time worrying about recruitment and get back to focusing on academics. <u>Connecting With Disconnected Youth: The Threshold Program – A Hybrid Learning Innovation</u> Strand: School Cultures

In the past year, we were all collectively confronted with many crises—the COVID-19 pandemic, racial upheaval, and the seemingly overnight overhaul of our education system from in-person teaching to remote learning. Destinations Career Academies (DCA) are a network of nationwide secondary schools and programs providing college and career readiness education in multiple delivery models (online and blended) to over 13,000 students in the DCA network of schools. Students engage collaboratively with their peers on simulations, explore career pathways through virtual job shadowing, are led through asynchronous and synchronous work based lessons, receive industry certification and dual college credit, and are taught by fully certified teachers and staff.
