




Choose a subject and see if you can think of something within that subject for each letter of the alphabet.

Garbage games

These are our top garbage games that you can make at home out of items that might otherwise end up in the bin! If it's a nice day, why not play them in the garden?

Noughts and crosses

Make the grid, O's and X's out of old cardboard boxes or packaging. You can make them as big or as small as you like. Why not add some colour or bright designs to help make the game more fun.



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Bowling

Using empty plastic bottles, create a ten pin bowling game, and use a rolled up sock or a small ball to knock them down. You could paint silly faces on the bottles or different shapes.

Tin can alley

Collect used tin cans (ask a parent to give them a clean first and make them safe from sharp edges) and stack them up high! See how many you can knock down with a ball. Each player gets three turns.

Indoor tennis

Create your very own Wimbledon. Use paper plates and empty toilet or kitchen rolls to make the rackets, then hang a sheet or towel over a piece of string. Blow up a balloon to use as a tennis ball.

Globetrotting...virtually!

Did you know that there are over 1.3 billion people living in India, or that the official animal of Scotland is the unicorn?

We may not be able to travel right now but that doesn't mean that the world cannot come to us.

Find a picture of a map of the world, close your eyes and point. Wherever you land, why not learn something new. Try to find out:

- What is that country/city most well-known for?
- How many people live there?
- What language do they speak? Could you learn a few words too?
- What is the national dish?
- Do they have any unusual customs?
- Visit the place on Google. Is it what you expected?

Get crafty with salt dough

Salt dough is fun and really easy to make, with a few simple ingredients.

You could make something to remember this time, like a plate with all your households' handprints on or you could make a nice ornament and put it in your window for people to see when they walk by.

You will need:

- 1 cupful of plain flour (about 250g)
- half a cupful of table salt (about 125g)
- half a cupful of water (about 125ml)

Method

- 1. Line a baking tray with a sheet of grease proof paper and preheat the oven to its lowest setting.
- 2. Mix the flour and salt in a large bowl and add the water. Mix until it comes together in a ball.
- 3. Transfer the dough to a floured work surface and shape/roll into your chosen model. Using cookie cutters you could cut out shapes or by carefully using a butter knife you could cut out numbers or letters.
- 4. Put your finished items on the baking tray and bake for 3 hours or until solid.
- 5. Leave to cool and then decorate.
