# USE THESE SAGE TIPS TO ENSURE YOUR CHILDREN'S START TO THE SCHOOL YEAR IS AS SMOOTH AND TROUBLE-FREE AS POSSIBLE. 

The start of a new school year brings a mix of emotions for kids and parents alike - from excitement over the promise of new beginnings to anxiety over the fear of the unknown. No matter how you child faces the new year, you can help to make the most of the experience with these tips can help your help your child start the new school year on the right foot.


Getting ready to go back to school is a major event in most households across the country this time of year. With these tips in mind, parents will be ready to help their students face the challenges, excitement and changes the new school year will bring.

1.EASE INTO A SCHEDULE
Most children spend their summers staying up late and sleeping in, which can make the adjustment to the school schedule a bit of a shock to the system. Plan for a soft transition by easing children into the school schedule gradually during the last week or two of summer break. By pushing bedtimes up by one-half or one hour each week, your child will be better prepared to meet that first early bell with a smile.


## PLAN TO EAT RIGHT

Re-focus summer eating habits that might have consisted of "food on the run" to healthy sit-down meals as a family whenever possible. When children spend many hours each day in a classroom, they need all the nutrition they can get to keep their brains in top performing condition. Begin with healthy breakfast selections at school (FREE TO ALL SCCPSS STUDENTS!) and try to have family dinner nights as often as possible throughout the week.

3SET UP A HOMEWORK STATION
Homework time will go more smoothly if all the necessary supplies are right at hand. Create a corner in the home, whether a desk in the bedroom or a space at the kitchen table, where kids have paper, pencils, erasers, and other supplies within easy reach. Once the station is created, use it at the same time every day, establishing a study time after school without any electronic devices unless they are required for the assignment.

4.MAKE THE PROPER INTRODUCTIONS
Plan to attend the Open House for your school. You'll find all the dates and times on our website, sccpss.com. Just look for the Back To School button on the home page. At Open House, you will meet the school principal, teachers, counselors, and school staff. It is recommended that you also meet any support staff your child might come in contact regularly, such as the school nurse or the media specialist! Simply putting a face to a name can go far in easing a child's first-day jitters - and a parent's anxiety as well.


TAKE A TOUR
If your child is starting a new school, a tour of the building will help him or her get the lay of land before that first bell rings. Again, this can be accomplished at the school Open House. At the same time, do a practice run or two to and from the school so your child is comfortable with the route, particularly if he will be riding his bike or walking to school on his own.

6.GET A HANDLE ON THE CURRICULUM
Parents have many sources for learning about the curriculum that will be used in their child's classroom during the upcoming year. An appointment with the teacher or principal is a good first step for collecting information. Some schools also feature orientation days where curriculum and goals for the classroom are reviewed. If the school doesn't make the information available, the state department of education will also have curriculum information on their website.

1.GET INVOLVED
If time allows, plan to get involved in your child's school experience. Volunteers will be welcomed back into the classroom during the first nine weeks. Watch the website for more information. Volunteer to help in the classroom, plan a class party or work in the lunchroom one day a week. There are many ways to get involved that allow you to observe your child in the school environment. If you are unable to volunteer, talk to your child every day about the school day and keep lines of communication with the teacher wide open. Joining the PTA at your school is another valuable way to get involved and show your support.


## LEARN THE ART OF ORGANIZATION

Creating an organizational system for your student makes it easy for them to keep track of assignments and other papers. Give the system a check-up once a week to ensure clutter doesn't begin to build up. Clean out backpacks weekly as well to catch stray permission slips and homework assignments before they fall through the cracks. You can check the Learning Management System, ItsLearning, for any communication your child's teacher may have sent home. Also, you may receive flyers and other information through Peach Jar.


## TEACH GOOD STUDY HABITS

Another important component for success during the later years of school is the development of good study habits. Students need to explore study methods and practices that work for them and then employ those practices throughout the year. The most important fact to drive home is that daily study is much more effective than last-minute cramming - which some strong-willed students may have to learn the hard way.

## KEEP IT POSITIVE

The most important part of preparing for the upcoming school year is to keep a positive attitude about the experience. When parents show a positive attitude towards school and academics, students will tend to do so as well. Keep the end goal in sight - the wonderful opportunity to learn new things - and your children will be more likely to embrace the school experience.

## SAVANNAH-CHATHAM EaLEARNING ACADEMY



During the pandemic, SCCPSS launched the Savannah-Chatham E-Learning Academy or SCELA. Any student seeking a full time, online option may register for an opportunity to enroll at SCELA. SCELA is an online public school with teachers who are practiced in the delivery of online instruction. Students accepted into SCELA for full-time instruction will transfer from their current school upon enrollment at SCELA. All enrolled students will be issued devices prior to the start of the school year.
"We have had great success with SCELA," said Bernadette Ball-Oliver, Interim Deputy Superintendent of Teaching and Learning. "We're always looking at continuous improvement. That's the whole model for schools and how we improve and make things better. We will continue to make the experience better for our kids."
"SCELA will be the only online learning option for this school year." Ball-Oliver continued. "This year, SCELA will welcome 12th graders to their virtual campus! All SCELA students have a learning coach -- a responsible adult who will communicate with the school and teacher on a regular basis and make sure the student logs on every day. There are commitments from all parties to make this a successful experience for our students."

The school does not require a uniform but expects students to be dressed appropriately for class sessions following the SCCPSS Code of Conduct for non-uniform days. Parents and students enrolling at SCELA must participate in an online orientation prior to the start of the school year. You can more information about SCELA at SCCPSS.com. Look for the E-Learning Academy under the "schools" tab.


The program's objective is to provide a variety of palatable, high-quality, safe, nutritious foods that students will enjoy eating at a price affordable to them. The menus are planned by a Registered Dietitian and chef. The school cafeteria serves as the nutrition laboratory in the schools. Many schools have gardens and practice "farm-to-table" production for their school cafeterias! SCCPSS has been awarded a Golden Radish Award at the Gold level for the district's Farm to School efforts.

Every student will have the opportunity to choose from a variety of nutritious, appetizing foods; served in a pleasant environment that provides adequate time to eat so they will be ready to learn. Our nutrition standards are based on current Dietary Guidelines for Americans, Institute of Medicine meal pattern recommendations as outlined in the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act. Nutritional values of meals will be evaluated over a school week based on new meal standards rather than judged on a single meal or food item.

Since foods must be eaten to provide nutrients, student preferences and input will be considered in menu planning. All new foods will be evaluated for nutrient
density, ingredients, and student acceptability. Student meals will meet the required calorie range by grade level and a variety of foods to support growth, development, and healthy weight. Foods will be prepared to ensure a balance between optimal nutrition and student acceptance. Competitive foods (a la carte and vending) offered to students in addition to meals will meet or exceed the Alliance for a Healthier Generation and the United States Department of Agriculture Healthier US School Challenge Standards.
Purchasing practices will ensure the use of high-quality ingredients, seasonal produce, and menu options to maximize acceptance and will reflect current science-based research, current Dietary Guidelines for Americans, Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act and Healthier US School Challenge menus are planned with foods specified to have reduced saturated fat, zero trans fats, reduced sodium and sugar and increased fiber.

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## SCCPSS TO PARENTS: <br> FILL OUT MEAL APPLICATION FORM AS FEDERAL WAIVERS EXPIRE

For the last two school years, schools have been able to offer breakfast and lunch at no charge to students. This was made possible during the pandemic thanks to the generous support of the U.S. Department of Agriculture reimbursing schools for meals served to students, regardless of their income.

The waiver which allowed SCCPSS to provide free meals ended June 30. For the school year 2022-2023, Savannah Chatham County Public Schools will continue to serve free breakfast for all students but is urging all families to complete and submit a Free and Reduced Meal Application, if you believe your student(s) may be eligible. The application can be completed online. There is no deadline, but parents are urged to get their application in to make sure all students will receive lunch at the appropriate rate. If you prefer a paper application, they are available at the Applications center located at 3609 Hopkins Street. There will also be a secured after hours drop box located at this site.

## SAVANNAH-CHATHAM COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS CONTINUE TO MAKE PROGRESS ON MAJOR INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS PAID FOR BY THE PENNY SALES TAX KNOWN AS ESPLOST.

Chatham County voters renewed the education penny sales tax, extending the $1 \%$ collection for another five years. ESPLOST IV passed with 74\% approval, the widest margin in its 20-year history. The previous best was $67 \%$ for ESPLOST II in 2011. With the passage of the ESPLOST III continuation in Chatham County on November 8, 2016, the existing bond debt has been retired, resulting in the eventual elimination of $\$ 139,706,985$ dollars of bond debt that would have been the burden of taxpayers. Over the span of the ESPLOST construction program, the district has replaced 22 schools, provided technology improvements for teaching and learning, and added safety and security enhancements at nearly every school in the district. SCCPSS has administrative oversite over 50 schools, plus several
other sites and administrative buildings. Every facility requires upkeep, and some buildings are much older than others.

A thoughtful effort has resulted in the identification of District needs through a data driven approach. SCCPSS utilizes a facility condition assessment to analyze the physical condition of each building. This process also served as a guide to determine the cost to replace, improve, or repair. Using current classroom space, populations trends, historical and current enrollment and housing trends, the data helps determine how ESPLOST funds are allocated, where new schools need to be built, and necessary facility additions or improvements. School buildings have a life span and often require modifications for better utilization, just as your home does.


SAVANNAH HIGH ATHLETIC COMPLEX
The 2,000-seat stadium and athletic complex at the School of Liberal Studies at Savannah High has been completed and football games are scheduled for the upcoming season. A ribbon cutting was held in May. The facility features artificial turf, a state-of-the-art multimedia scoreboard, and amenities for multiple sports.


WINDSOR FOREST HIGH SCHOOL (LEFT) SCCPSS will replace the high school at Windsor Forest with ESPLOST IV funding. The school will house up to 900 students. The new school will be constructed on the current site and will be designed by Cogdell \& Mendrala Architects. The building is expected to cost approximately $\$ 56$ million


BEACH HIGH AUDITORIUM
The Beach High Auditorium has been completed and is ready for use this school year. The new building provides an auditorium with more than 600 seats that includes a raised stage, lobby, scene shop, dressing rooms, and state of the art sound and lighting systems. The facility designed for both school and community use. A ribbon cutting for the newly named Richard R. Mole, Sr. Auditorium was held in April 2022.

## WOODVILLE TOMPKINS HIGH GYM AND AUDITORIUM

Work is nearly complete on the new gym and auditorium at Woodville Tompkins Technical and Career High School. The new 1200-seat gym is finished, and the completion of the auditorium is imminent.

## PULASKI SCHOOL

Currently serving as an elementary school, renovations planned for Pulaski will allow the school to be converted to a $\mathrm{K}-8$. This will increase efficiencies for the zoned school family, as well as provide updated facilities for the 8-year-old building.


SAVANNAH ARTS ACADEMY RENOVATIONS
Savannah Arts Academy will have a new kitchen/cafeteria, HVAC system, LED lighting and updated interior finishes when the project is finished. Site improvements will also include additional parking, stormwater management and landscaping. Construction is expected to get underway in September with completion of all projects scheduled for the end of July 2023.


K-12 MULTI-SCHOOL CAMPUS Work continues at the multi-campus property on the former Groves site. The creation of a Multi-School Campus will bring Gould Elementary School, Mercer Middle School and Groves High School to one unique campus design that will maximize resources for the most effective use ESPLOST funding. The project has a target completion date in 2023 for occupation during the 2023-24 School Year.

## JACOB G. SMITH ELEMENTARY

Once a candidate for renovation and modernization, the facility management process indicates that Jacob G. Smith school would be better served with a new facility. The plans are in the design phase.


# SCCPSS ACHIEVES GADOEE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENJ DESIGNATION 

The Georgia Department of Education has given the Savannah-Chatham County Public School System the 2021-2022 Economic Development Partnership Designation. The EDP is a district wide certification process that prepares school districts to adopt best practices and behaviors that support economic development, strengthen their programs, and align education with key regional industries. In terms of Economic Development, the EDP elevates the capability of school systems to fill their role in the community business recruitment and expansion
efforts and as a catalyst for talent development in the community.

SCCPSS Superintendent Dr. Ann Levett says, "The work that was done to achieve this designation is part of our district's vision of preparing all students for productive futures. Savannah-Chatham County Public Schools already have many robust partnerships with area business and industry. Working through the Economic Development Partnership program will strengthen these partnerships as well as assist us in building
new relationships that will help our students succeed."

CTAE in Savannah-Chatham County Public School System (SCCPSS) is strongly supported by business and industry and economic development partners. There is clear pathway alignment to local labor market needs and there is continuous review to ensure that the pathways offered are meaningful and relevant.  TEEN MENTNGITTS VACCINATION
## All students entering or

 transferring into 11th grade must have received a meningococcal booster shot (MCV4), unless their first dose was received on or after their 16th birthday. MCV4 helps prevent meningococcal disease, a bacterial infection that can be very dangerous.
Meningococcal meningitis can cause swelling of the brain and spinal cord resulting in brain damage, hearing loss, or worse. "This immunization requirement became effective in July 2021," reminds Chatham County Health Department Nurse Manager, Sierra Peebles, MSN, CPNP. Parents who are unsure if their teen needs this immunization are encouraged to call the health department at 912-356-2441.

Today in the United States, one out of every five of our neighbors speaks a language other than English at home - that's more than 64 million people. Another 10 million are deaf or have other impairments that prevent them from communicating with others. Many struggle to communicate as they navigate their everyday lives. A doctor's visit, a parent-teacher conference, or trip to the bank - things we take for granted - are often challenging for these individuals. As most of us would, they may feel frustrated or excluded. SCCPSS has secured the services of Language Line, an internationally recognized

provider of translation and interpretive services Language Line provides on-demand access to professional interpreters in 240-plus languages via three formats: mobile, video, and phone.

Fall sports will get underway at SCCPSS schools this Fall with no capacity restrictions. Both the Islands Athletic and the Savannah High Athletic Facilities are prepared to welcome athletes and spectators to the stadiums. These state-of-the-art facilities are great assets to the district's athletic programs. Not only do they reduce the dependence on outside facilities, they reduce the expense of renting those facilities.

Security screenings will be conducted at all gates. In addition, clear bags will be required at athletic events. Bags should be clear plastic, vinyl or PVC and should not exceed $12^{\prime \prime} \times 6^{\prime \prime} \times 12^{\prime \prime}$. A one-gallon clear plastic freezer bag (Ziploc bag or similar) is acceptable. Small clutch bags approximately the size of a hand, with or without a handle or strap can be taken into the venue with one of the clear plastic bags. Exceptions will be made for medically necessary items after proper inspection.

SCCPSS offers Cheerleading, Cross Country, Football, Softball, Volleyball, Basketball, Cheerleading, Swimming, Wrestling, Baseball, Golf, Lacrosse, Soccer, Tennis and Track \& Field. This year, several schools will field teams in Girls Flag Football. This exciting sport offers young women athletes an opportunity to participate in a traditionally "male" activity.

Tickets for athletic events can be purchased and accessed through GoFan, our electronic ticketing system. The process to buy a ticket is quick and easy. Using your phone, you may scan a QR code or a link, or you may search for the event you wish to attend. Then simply select the event for which they are planning to buy tickets. Tickets prices may vary by sporting event. Purchasing a ticket online is easy, safe and fast. There is no waiting in line and no lost tickets!



## 5 THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT GETTING TO SCHOOL SAFELY

With the start of school comes a new mindset about safety. Here are a few things to keep in mind:

If your child is a car rider, take a "test drive" before the first day of to make sure you know where the drop-off and pick-up lines are. Be sure to note the times of day that traffic is heaviest!

If your child is walking to school, make sure there is adequate supervision. For adequate adult supervision, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends one adult per three children for children ages 4 to 6 and one adult for six children for older elementary children ages 7 to 9 . Fewer adults may be necessary for children ages 10 and older. Walk the route with your child a couple of times to note where any unsafe areas might be, and remind your child to obey traffic signals, as well as the crossing guards!

If your child is riding a bike, it's important that they wear a helmet every day! Bicyclists, just like car drivers, need to follow rules of the road. Use the bike lanes, stop at the stop signs, and use hand signals for turning. Wear reflective clothing or add lights to your bike so you will be seen easily and remember that there is safety in numbers. Find a riding buddy! And don't forget a bike lock.

Bus transportation is not guaranteed within the district. Because of a staffing shortage, only students with an IEP (or 504 plan) that requires transportation and those students in zoned schools will be transported. You can download the "Here Comes The Bus" app to see where you bus is and when it will arrive at school or home. Go to sccpss.com and search for "Here Comes the Bus."

Driving to school is a privilege for many teenagers. Make sure your teen is aware of the requirements for parking on campus. Always be sure to put the phone down and in lock position. Pick your music, text your friends, or map your location before you start the vehicle.

As always, remember to slow down, especially during the first few weeks of school, as people are familiarizing themselves with routes and plans. More cars on the road means more potential for accidents. Abide by the slower speed limits in school zones and build in a little extra time so you can arrive safely to your destination.

Once you are properly identified, your student's access ID and password will be provided. Each child will have a separate access ID and you will need to link each to the account you create in the portal.
