God's Word to us

A Public Service of Healing



The service begins as appointed for a celebration of the Holy Eucharist, or with the Penitential Order, or with the following greeting

Celebrant: Grace and peace be with you, from God our Father and the Lord

Jesus Christ.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

The Celebrant says this or some other appropriate Collect

O God of peace, you have taught us that in returning and rest we shall be saved, in quietness and confidence shall be our strength: By the might of your Spirit lift us, we pray, to your presence, where we may be still and know that you are God; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever.

People: Amen.

One or two lessons are read before the Gospel. Between the Lessons, and before the Gospel, a Psalm, hymn, or anthem may be sung or said.

A sermon or meditations, or a period of silence, or both, may follow the Gospel.

The service continues with the Creed, or with the Prayers of the People.

For the Prayers of the People a Litany of Healing, as follows, may be used.

Litany of Healing

The Celebrant introduces the Litany with this bidding

Celebrant: Let us name before God those for whom we offer our

prayers.

The People audibly name those for whom they are interceding.

A Person appointed then leads the Litany

Celebrant: God the Father, your will for all people is health and salvation:

People: We praise you and thank you, O Lord.

Celebrant: God the Son, you came that we might have life, and might have it

more abundantly:

People: We praise you and thank you, O Lord.

Celebrant: God the Holy Spirit, you make our bodies the temple of your

presence;

People: We praise you and thank you, O Lord.

Celebrant: Holy Trinity, one God, in you we live and move and have our being;

People: We praise you and thank you, O Lord.

Celebrant: Lord, grant your healing grace to all who are sick, injured, or

disabled, that they may be made whole;

People: Hear us, O Lord of life.

Celebrant: Grant to all who seek your guidance, and all who are lonely,

anxious, or despondent, a knowledge of your will and an

awareness of your presence;

People: Hear us, O Lord of life.

Celebrant: Mend broken relationships, and restore those in emotional

distress to soundness of mind and serenity of spirit;

People: Hear us, O Lord of life.

Celebrant: Bless physicians, nurses, chaplains, hospice workers, caregivers and all

others who minister to the suffering, granting them wisdom and skill,

sympathy and patience;

People: Hear us, O Lord of life.

Celebrant: Grant to the dying peace and a holy death, and uphold by the grace

and consolation of your Holy Spirit those who are bereaved:

People: Hear us, O Lord of life.

Celebrant: Restore to wholeness whatever is broken by human sin, in our lives,

in our nation, and in the world;

People: Hear us, O Lord of life.

Celebrant: You are the Lord who does wonders:

People: You have declared your power among the peoples.

Celebrant: With you, O Lord, is the well of life:

People: And in your light we see light.

Celebrant: Hear us, O Lord of life:

People: Heal us, and make us whole.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

A period of silence follows.

The Celebrant concludes the Prayers with one of the following or some other suitable Collect:

Almighty God, giver of life and health: Send your blessing on all who are sick, and upon those who minister to them, that all weakness may be vanquished by the triumph of the risen Christ; who lives and reigns for ever and ever.

People: Amen.

Or this

Heavenly Father, you have promised to hear what we ask in the Name of your Son: Accept and fulfill our petitions, we pray, not as we ask in our ignorance, nor as we deserve in our sinfulness, but as you know and love us in your Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

People: Amen

Or this

O Lord our God, accept the fervent prayers of your people; in the multitude of your mercies look with compassion upon us and all who turn to you for help; for you are gracious, O lover of souls, and to you we give glory, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

People: Amen

A Confession of Sin follows,

Celebrant: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Celebrant & People:

Most merciful God,
We confess that we have sinned against you
In thought, word, and deed,
By what we have done,
And by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,
Have mercy on us and forgive us;
That we may delight in your will,
And walk in your ways,
To the glory of your Name
Amen

The Celebrant stands and asks God's blessing and forgiveness with the following words:

May Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, keep you in eternal life.

People: Amen

The Celebrant now invites those who wish to receive the laying on of hands (and anointing) to come forward.

If oil for the anointing of the sick is to be blessed, the Book of Common Prayer, page 225, is used.

The following anthem is sing or said

Celebrant: Savior of the world, by your cross and precious blood you have

redeemed us;

People: Save us, and help, us we humbly beseech you, O Lord.

The Celebrant says the following blessing over those who have come forward.

Celebrant: The Almighty Lord, who is a strong tower to all who put their trust in

him, to whom all things in heaven, on earth, and under the earth bow and obey: Be now and evermore your defense, and make you known and feel that the only Name under heaven given for health and

salvation is the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

People: Amen.

The Celebrant then lays hands on each person (and, having dipped a thumb in the oil of the sick, makes the sign of the cross on their foreheads, and says one of the following:

(Name) I anoint you with oil in the and I (or we) lay my hands (or our) hands

upon you in the Name of Father and of the Son and of the Holy

Spirit.

People: Amen.

Or this:

(Name), I lay my hands upon you and anoint you with oil in the Name of the

Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, beseeching our Lord Jesus Christ to sustain you with his presence, to drive away all sickness of body and spirit, and to give you that victory of life and peace which

will enable you to serve him both now and evermore.

People: Amen.

Or prayers may be offered for each person individually according to that person's need, with laying on of hands and anointing.

Lay persons with a gift of healing may join the celebrant in the laying on of hands. If there is not to be a Communion, the service concludes with the Lord's Prayer and the prayer and blessings given below.

If the Eucharist is to be celebrated, the Liturgy continues with the Offertory.


In place of the usual post communion prayer (or, if there has not been a Communion, after the Lord's Prayer), the following prayer is said:

Almighty and eternal God, so draw our hearts to you, so guide our minds, so fill our imaginations, so control our wills, that we may be wholly yours, utterly dedicated to you; and then use us, we pray, as you will, and always to your glory and the welfare of your people; through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

The celebrant pronounces this blessing:

Celebrant: May God the Father bless you, God the Son heal you, God the Holy Spirit give you strength. May God the holy and undivided Trinity guard your body, save your soul, and bring you safely to his heavenly country; where he lives and reigns for ever and ever.

People: Amen.


