Definition of "Veteran"

3

Michigan

- Served in the US Armed Forces, including reserve components
- Discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable
- Includes individual who died while on active duty

Federal

- Served in the active military, navel or air service
- Discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable

- US Navy (Sailor)
 - US Coast Guard (Coast Guardsman) is part of Homeland Security
- US Space Force (Space War Fighters)

- Active Duty/Reserve/National Guard
- Myths: PTSD, Combat, Difficult transition



Veterans Health Administration Facilities

- □ 5 VA Medical Centers
 - Ann Arbor
 - Battle Creek
 - Detroit
 - □ Iron Mountain
 - Saginaw
- 28 VA Community Based Outpatient Clinics (CBOCs)
- 8 Vet Centers



Veterans Health Administration

- Must apply for services
- Each medical benefits package is unique
 - Depends on income level, disability rating and military service history
- Receive care at VA or in community
- Services include standard medical care, vision, dental, assisted living/home health care, mental health and prescriptions



Veterans Benefits Administration

Detroit Regional Benefit Office

- Veterans must apply for benefits
- Can work with an Accredited Veteran Service Officer to assist with the claims process
- □ Includes:
 - Disability Compensation
 - Pension (based on income)
 - Home Loans
 - Veteran Readiness & Employment
 - Education Benefits



National Cemetery Administration

Active: Fort Custer (Augusta), Great Lakes (Holly)

Historic: Mackinac Island and Port Huron

- □ Burial Benefits
 - Gravesite in national cemetery
 - Perpetual care
 - Government headstone or marker
 - Burial Flag
 - Presidential Memorial Certificate

- MVAA Community Outreach and Regional Engagement (CORE) partners




- Extension of MVAA to each region

Challenge: Where do veterans turn for assistance?



Libraries = Force Multiplier

"Libraries can play this role in helping to extend the outreach capacity of military and veterans' organizations, allowing them to reach service members, veterans, and caregivers who are in need of support but unaware of or disillusioned with military and veterans' organizations." (LeMire, 2017, pg. 46)

Force Multiplication

A factor or a combination of factors that gives personnel or weapons the ability to accomplish greater things than without it.

Why should libraries help?

- Content providers vs. community collaborators
- Relationship builders who avoid duplicating work done by other organizations
- Knowledge Managers employees with master's degrees in the science of information
- Assist with bridging gaps in knowledge about military/veteran culture
- Assist organizations with outreach and community support
- Creative collaboration at the local level so that the United
 States can continue to support an all-volunteer military.

How can libraries support Veterans?

- Know key people/organization to contact for any veteran issues
 - MVAA, VA, County, Regional Coordinators
- Build a collection of materials appropriate for veterans,
 service members and their families
- Have section on your website
- Provide meeting space for veteran organizations
- Provide programs beyond Veteran's Day:
 - employment, resume building, a veteran history program
- Veterans Crisis Line (800-273-8255, Press 1)




Examples in Michigan


