INVITATION to participate in the FUTURE AFRICA and 1 HOPE Webinar Series



The recommendation for the webinar series stemmed from a University of Pretoria proposal to the UNICEF Humanitarian Programme through its flagship programme "Generation Unlimited" to collaborate with the University on areas that can advance training and skills for the youth in humanitarian aspects. The UP proposal focuses on "Youth empowerment under health/economic crisis," coordinated by Future Africa with participation of Humanities, Health Sciences, Education, Economic Sciences, Natural and Agricultural Sciences and Veterinary Science." In particular, the proposal focuses on Outcome Area 4 identified as "Covid-19 and other Emerging Science for Society Outcomes, specifically incorporating the One Health concept, defined as "a collaborative, multisectoral, and transdisciplinary approach working at the local, regional, national, and global levels – with the goal of achieving optimal health [and well-being] outcomes recognising the interconnection between people, animals, plants and their shared environment. Increasingly recognised nationally /globally by organisations /commissions and coupled with Covid-19, it is becoming clear that the OH approach " has stimulated moderns societies to rapidly adopt measures to save lives (humanitarian), protect livelihoods (social dynamics and human solidarity), and safeguard nature (ecosystem red lines) to reduce the risk of future pandemics (resilience, preparedness, precaution)."

Against this background, "the overarching long-term objective is to bring together various research teams at UP across disciplines and in many countries, who have relevant science [natural, social, health] activities that can be connected to address complex Covid-19 research questions in the immediate future with broader applications in the long term." Specific short-term objectives (August 2020- December 2020) underpinning the One Health for Change cluster include: (1) organising cluster workshops; (2) strengthening workforce developments in association with African / other global networks; (3) launching a UP OH on-line platform (website) for information and education dissemination; (4) organising One Health webinars and training; (5) developing resource capacity focused on young career scholars and doctoral students that can drive multi/trans-disciplinary projects; and (6) supported by short-term mentorship programmes and multidisciplinary short-term research projects.

Informed by the definition that "transdisciplinarity integrates the natural, social and health sciences in a humanities context, and transcends their traditional boundaries," the Future Africa - 1 HOPE (international One Planet for One Health Education initiative) webinar series focuses primarily on objectives #4 and #5 above

Who can attend?

The Future Africa - 1 HOPE (international One Planet for One Health Education initiative) webinar series main aim is to build collaborative transdisciplinary (TD) research capacity of early career and doctoral students through a One Health &Well-Being lens." More specifically, the series has four main goals:

- To meet and engage with a cross-section of multi-disciplinary experts linked with national, regional and global networks;
- To raise awareness of the urgent need to shift from disciplinary silos to address complex socially relevant issues (e.g., Covid-19, climate change, food security) by transcending and integrating disciplinary paradigms and engaging in participatory research;
- To identify transdisciplinary knowledge and research skills needed to co-produce relevant outcomes for society (p/see #2,#5,#6 above);
- To reconcile TD research, teaching/learning and scholarship.

1 HOPE is especially timely and relevant in this regard as it seeks to educate the next generation of global citizens about the criticality of ensuring the sustainability of the planet and all species - made especially poignant at this time of global Covid-19 upheaval. Its overall approach is to establish regional working groups (WGs) to promote and value the OHWB concept as the foundation for achieving the UN-2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) conducting regional needs analyses and developing pilot project proposals, including TD / OHWB research and education. To date WGs have been established in Africa and the Americas with other regions to follow in 2020/2021. WG members - supported by committed group facilitators- are drawn from education, community/civil society, government (intergovernmental/NGOs) and corporate sectors.

Early career and doctoral scholars, and advanced graduate students worldwide are encouraged to participate in the Future Africa - 1 HOPE (international One Planet for One Health Education initiative) webinar series.



Cheikh Mbow

Professor Cheikh Mbow is the Director of Future Africa at the University of Pretoria. He served at START-International in Washington DC and Lead Scientist at the World Agroforestry Center in Kenya. He is Adjunct Associate Professor at Michigan State University's Department of Forestry. He worked on the development of transdisciplinary approaches to address Africa's development challenges by establishing frameworks for thriving sustainability science to support need transformation in the continent.

George Lueddeke [PhD, MEd, Dipl. AVES (Hon.)] is an education advisor in higher, medical and One Health education. Originally from Canada, now residing in the UK, he chairs the international One Health for One Planet Education initiative (1 HOPE) engaging international and national organisations in advancing the One Health & Well-Being concept and the UN-2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) across six global regions. In the UK he has held posts in higher education and medical education at Southampton University's Faculty of Medicine, receiving the Vice Chancellor Teaching Excellence Award in interprofessional education. As a researcher and author, he has published widely on change management, innovation and education leadership. His current publication is entitled 'Survival: One Health, One Planet, One Future,' (2019/2020), including "Ten Propositions for Global Sustainability." His follow-up chapter, "Universities in the Early Decades of the Third Millennium: Saving the World from itself?," has recently been published. Invited as a plenary speaker to different corners of the world, he has presented sessions for such organizations as the American Medical Association (AMC), the Public Health Association of South Africa (PHASA) as well as the World Veterinary Association and the World Medical Association in Kitakyushi, Japan. In 2019 he was recipient of the American Epidemiological Society honorary diploma.



George Lueddeke



Professor Bassirou Bonfohis a Togolese veterinarian and holds a DVM and a PhD in biology. He worked for 5 years in West Africa (The Gambia, Guinée Conakry, Mali, Liberia), as livestock development program coordinator with Vétérinaires Sans Frontières. He went for a 4 years epidemiology postdoctoral fellowship at Swiss Federal Institute of Technology Zurich (ETHZ) and Swiss Tropical and Public Health Institute (Swiss TPH) on health risks and determinants of dairy sector development. He led later 4 years a research group on "Avenues of extensive livestock production system" in the Horn Africa, West Africa and Central Asia in the framework of the NCCR North-South where he contributed to validate the One Health concept on zoonosis control. Since 2009, he is Managing Director of Centre Suisse de Recherches Scientifiques en Côte d'Ivoire (CSRS, www.csrs.ch(link is external)). He is currently the Director of the consortium Afrique One "Ecosystem & Population health: expanding the frontiers in health" funded by the Wellcome Trust. He has developed modules on soft skills for researchers in Africa (www.afriqueone.net(link is external)) comprising research administration management and governance, research design and science communication and contributed to develop the "Participatory Risk Analysis" methods for animal source food in informal sector.B. Bonfoh is guest lecturer at University of Lomé (Togo), University of Abidjan (Côte d'Ivoire) and at the Pan African veterinary school in Senegal and member of scientific advisory board of several agriculture and health research institutes and initiatives in Africa.

Prof Liesel Ebersöhn is the Director of the Centre for the Study of Resilience and a professor in the Department of Educational Psychology in the Faculty of Education at the University of Pretoria and a registered educational psychologist. Liesel is an expert on social dimensions of resilience with extensive experience in intervention research on transdisciplinary resilience-enabling pathways to positive health and wellbeing outcomes in severely challenged Southern African spaces. She is engaged in high-level global education and poverty think tanks, panels and boards, is influential in Global South education development circles and actively supports education policy reform in the Global South based on evidence of resilience-enabling transformation in Africa. She is a recipient of numerous scientific associations, national and institutional awards and current Secretary-General of the World Education Research Association (WERA).

She studied for her Bachelor's Degree in Veterinary medicine at the University of Nairobi and a Master's of Science in Veterinary Epidemiology and Public Health from the Royal Veterinary College. Diana's interest is in rural development particularly with the pastoral and agro-pastoral communities in Africa. She is currently working with an international NGO Vétérinaires Sans Frontières Suisse based in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia as the Regional Project Manager of a One Health project. The project, One Health for Humans, Environment, Animals and Livelihoods (HEAL) is being implemented in Kenya, Somalia and Ethiopia and aims to improve health service delivery to pastoralists communities using the One Health approach. Diana looks forward to sharing and learning more on how research can feed into the development of the rural areas in Africa.

Dr. Ursin Bayisenge is the One Health Research Associate and Junior Faculty | Lecturer at the Centre for One Health within UGHE. His role is to support One Health academic processes and programs related to research, curriculum, staff, faculty and students; develop new and promote existing relationships with One Health

organizations, and scholars across the world. In research, he supports in writing project deliverables, such as protocols, reports, publications and mentor students completing One Health research projects through their practicum. Additionally, he supports resource mobilization for One Health programming, including preparing grant applications to external funding sources, coordinating reporting to external funders, and managing financial approvals and other financial processes. Prior to joining the UGHE team, Dr. Bayisenge worked as a Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTD) Research Senior Officer and National Coordinator of Malaria program at Rwanda Biomedical Center where he contributed to the elaboration, implementation and publication of several national NTD surveys as well as coordination of malaria control interventions within 2 districts. He also served as a general practitioner in 3 Rwandan districts hospitals where he mostly served vulnerable people. Dr. Bayisenge holds a medical degree from the University of Rwanda and a Master of Science in Global Health Delivery (MGHD) from UGHE. His research interests are focused on finding practical solutions and needed evidences, to tackle NTDs and other crosscutting health disparities through multidisciplinary collaboration.

Ayinka-Asahkee Brown is a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine by training and a holism-oriented conservationist at heart. In pursuing a career in Wildlife and Conservation Medicine, she came to realise that her path would involve education, advocacy, and influencing policy. She firmly believes that the sustainable conservation of species and resources is not achieved in a vacuum.
