March 2020 Versus 2021: the Anniversary of a Pandemic



A year ago, last March, Temple Beth Emet made the decision to call off our Purim Carnival due to concerns that the event could spread the coronavirus among our members. Less than a day after our Temple made this difficult decision, the mayor of Los Angeles essentially shut down the city. Schools closed their buildings and scrambled to provide classes on-line. Businesses also scrambled to adjust, having some employees work from home. Our Temple, following the lead of LA County and BUSD, moved its classes to Zoom. Grocery stores started offering curbside pick-up, or shopping hours specifically aimed at seniors. Buildings were required to limit capacity to slow the viral spread. In short, Temple Beth Emet was just a little bit ahead of the curve.

This month, the month of March, we're a year in, but we don't expect to be in this situation next year. Already, many of our seniors and front-line workers have already received the vaccine. Most of the population of Los Angeles County, however, is still waiting.

The vaccinations of our seniors and many of the most vulnerable within our families does, for some, change their individual families' cost-benefit analysis for many events. For persons living alone, the psychological cost of isolation has been significant, causing them to forego personal safety in order to see friends and family. For others of us living with seniors or persons with compromised immune systems, that analysis changes: it's one thing to chose to risk your own health for your own psychological well-being. It is an entirely different issue when your decisions influence the life or well-being of another family member.

Luckily, as more people are able to be vaccinated, that individual-and family-based cost-benefit analysis will also change. Families will be willing to take more risks as the benefits to doing so rise, and the potential cost for doing so drops. Don't get me wrong: the financial cost of missing work for a month is not insignificant, nor is a fear of lingering and unknown health complications related to the virus. For many of us, those potential costs will continue

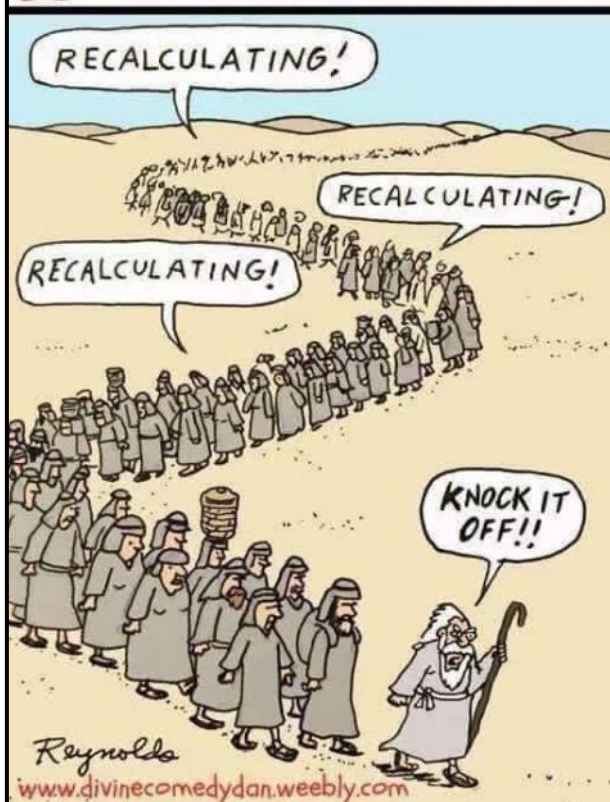

to be viewed as too high for taking risks until we, ourselves, are vaccinated. That said, it really does feel better when the preventable death of a loved one gets removed from your family's cost-benefit analysis for, say, a visit to the dentist's office.

As for my family, we live with two seniors. Our kids, both teenagers, do miss their friends. We have limited our contacts with friends and family outside our household, and closely followed the stay-at-home orders. My husband checks the N.Y. Times' statistics on the national death rate, and pays attention to the local numbers as well, every day. He writes them on a calendar hanging in the downstairs restroom. We have signs taped to the front door, reminding us to take masks when we leave the house. However, now that the grandparents have received vaccines, we are all less worried. No, we're not planning to host a party in our house or plan a trip involving air travel any time soon, but we are less worried. If one of them needs to see a dentist or eye doctor, or even just get a hair cut, there won't be an obligatory family discussion around their safety. Two family members have regained some of the independence they lost back in March of 2020, and that's significant.

For the rest of us waiting to be vaccinated, we need to hang in there. The list will get shorter and our names will eventually rise to the top. The cost-benefit analysis of a visit to the barber, or going into Trader Joe's, or meeting friends for a coffee outdoors, will continue to change in our favor. As usual, Temple Beth Emet is ahead of the curve, planning outdoor events for members as local parks have opened for sports activities.

I look forward to the time when we can break bread within our Temple without the fears that have plagued us this past year. That time is much closer today than it was back in March of 2020.

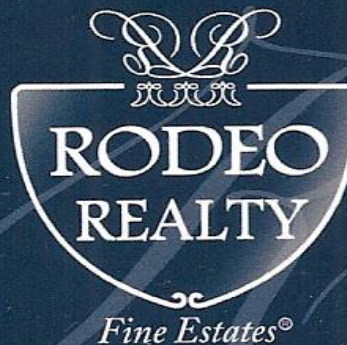
