

CONFESSION OF SINS

Dear people of God, in this Christmas season it is our duty and delight to hear again the message of the angels and, in heart and mind, “go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us.”

We consider from Holy Scripture the story of the loving purposes of God from the first days after our fall into sin to the glorious redemption—

SECOND BIBLE READING

Acts 18:24-28

A Jew named Apollos, a native of Alexandria, came to Ephesus. He was an eloquent man and well versed in the Scriptures. He had been instructed in the way of the Lord. He spoke with burning zeal and taught the facts about Jesus accurately, although he knew only the baptism of John. He began to speak boldly in the synagogue. But when Priscilla and Aquila heard him, they took him home and explained to him the way of God more accurately. When he wanted to cross over to Achaia, the brothers encouraged him and wrote to the disciples to welcome him. When he arrived, he provided much help to those who had become believers by grace, because he vigorously refuted the Jews in public, proving from the Scriptures that Jesus was the Christ.

THIRD BIBLE READING

Luke 1:26-38, 46-55

In the sixth month, the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee named Nazareth, to a virgin pledged in marriage to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you. Blessed are you among women." But she was greatly troubled by the statement and was wondering what kind of greeting this could be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, because you have found favor with God. Listen, you will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to name Him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and His kingdom will never end." Mary said to the angel, "How will this be, since I am a virgin?" The angel answered her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. Listen, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age even though she was called barren, and this is her sixth month. For nothing will be impossible for God." Then Mary said, "See, I am the Lord's servant. May it happen to me as you have said." Then the angel left her... Then Mary said, My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, and my spirit has rejoiced in God my Savior, because He has looked with favor on the humble state of His servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed, because the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is His name. His mercy is for those who fear Him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with His arm. He has scattered those who were proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down rulers from their thrones. He has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, but the rich He has sent away empty. He has come to the aid of His servant Israel, remembering His mercy, as He spoke to our fathers, to Abraham and His offspring forever.

The Christian Church Year- Celebrations of God's Mercy

Advent to Epiphany to pre-lent to Lent to Tri-Diem
to Easter to Pentecost to ... ???
Calendar-Clutter or Word-Wonder?






The Christian church year glorifies God by teaching and reinforcing Truth from generation to generation. Christian Festivals dot the calendar. They celebrate the gracious redeeming activities of the triune God. The church year calendar divides into two parts. The **first half** reviews the earthly life of Jesus Christ. The **second half** reviews Jesus Christ's teachings as we, His followers, put them into practice in our lives.



FIRST HALF OF THE CHURCH YEAR – THE LIFE OF CHRIST

The Christmas Cycle or The Time of Christmas

- **ADVENT** (four Sundays; preparation for the coming of Christ)
- **CHRISTMAS** (twelve days celebrating the birth of Christ)
- **EPIPHANY** (January 6; the revealing of the Savior to the non-Jews)
- **BAPTISM** of Jesus (first Sunday after Epiphany)
- **TRANSFIGURATION** of our Lord (last Sunday after Epiphany)



THE EASTER CYCLE OR THE TIME OF EASTER


- **LENT** (beginning on Ash Wednesday; a time of 40 days, not counting the five Sundays; preparation for crucifixion)
 - **HOLY WEEK** (including **PALM SUNDAY**, **MAUNDY THURSDAY**, **GOOD FRIDAY** - The final three days of this week are called the **TRI-DIEM**)
 - **EASTER SUNDAYS** (seven including Easter Sunday, Resurrection Day of Jesus Christ from the dead)
 - **ASCENSION** (Easter +40th day)
 - **PENTECOST** (Easter + 50th day; celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit)

SECOND HALF OF THE CHURCH YEAR

THE MINISTRY OF CHRIST THROUGH HIS BELIEVERS, HIS CHURCH;

Ordered Time of the Church; Non-Festival Half of the Church Year; Season of Christ's Church

- **TRINITY** Sunday (first Sunday after **Pentecost**)
- **Sundays after Pentecost** (lasts approximately six months)



Many judge liturgy to be dead, predictable, dull, repetitive religious ceremony. Therefore, many judge liturgy to be bad and terminally out of touch, boring. Many congregations boast that they are “anti-liturgical.”

But “Liturgy” means “work of the people”. It was designed to be for people not against them. It gives a basic structure on which we see God’s mercies on display. This pattern of worship is not a new made-up thing that hasn’t been time-tested. It is tried and true, time-tested and still standing strong.

WHY USE A PATTERN IN WORSHIP, A LITURGY? HERE ARE 7 BENEFITS:


1. **HISTORIC ROOTS.** The race of faith is a relay, one generation handing on to the next the faith once delivered to the

saints. Parts of the liturgy go back to the apostolic period, some go back to synagogue and temple worship actions.

2. **A DISTINGUISHING MARK.** A liturgy distinguishes us from those who do not believe, teach, and confess the same as we do. What we believe (God’s Word) determines how we worship; how we worship confesses what we believe (God’s Word). I do not believe as the Buddhists or the Islamicists. My pattern of worship is visibly different because of the content of my faith.

3. **REPETITION.** It is, after all, the mother of learning. Fixed texts and annual cycles of readings lend to deep learning. Obviously, mindless repetition does not accomplish anything; nor does endless variety.

4. **Community.** Worship is a shared activity. The Holy Spirit instructed, “Let us go to the house of the Lord.” (Psalm 122) I am gathered by the Holy



Spirit for four reasons:

- A) **to give God my Savior the glory** He deserves;
- B) **to bless my fellow worshippers**; we have each received the gifts of Christ that bind us together;
- C) **to encourage each other** to love and good works (Hebrews 10:25);
- D) **to build up one another in the faith.** (1 Thessalonians 5:11)

5. **STAND FIRM IN THE FACE OF THE “HERE AND NOW.”** When the Roman world was going to hell in a hand basket, the church was debating the two natures of Christ, not Roman politics. In worship liturgy, God's Word sets the agenda. God's Word defines eternal needs. God's Word uncovers and then answers our questions. The liturgy teaches us to live by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God. The Liturgy is a tool that promotes Truth, not passing fads or fears or politically correct speech.
6. **EXTERNAL AND OBJECTIVE PATTERN FROM CHILDHOOD TO ADULTHOOD.** Feelings vary. Feelings come and go. The liturgy supplies an anchor for life in Jesus Christ, crucified and risen. This is repeated and celebrated through Water and the Word, through Communion and the Word, through proclamation of God's Word.
7. **THE WORD OF GOD.** Most of the sentences and songs of a liturgy are paraphrases, quotations or summaries from Scripture, such as the Creed or the Seasonal Responses. Faith comes from hearing the message of the Word of Christ (Romans 10:17). Liturgy is a well-traveled road on which we hear of Christ crucified. The message of the cross is the power of God (1 Corinthians 1:18). God does not promise to impart spiritual life and power outside of the presentation of His gospel. We call it the “means of grace” because it is the “way”, the “means”, through which God has chosen to create, nourish, and sustain faith in Himself.
