Egypt to Convert Old Vehicles to Run on Natural Gas

With the aim of preserving the environment and making use of the country's plentiful natural gas production, the Egyptian government plans to scrap old and rickety cars manufactured over 20 years ago and replace them with new ones running on natural gas, as well as to convert hundreds of thousands of vehicles to gas-powered models.

Egypt's President Abdel-Fattah El-Sisi has inaugurated the country's first exhibition to showcase technologies of converting vehicles to run on natural gas, as part of an Egyptian strategy to convert hundreds of thousands of vehicles to run on natural gas, instead of, or along with, gasoline.

The strategy aims to reduce fuel imports, decrease pollution from harmful emissions, ensure the safety of drivers and passengers, and tap into unexploited auto factories.

The show aims at informing companies and the public about the national programmes available to finance the conversion of cars to run on natural gas and the economic and environmental benefits of expanding in the use of natural gas for vehicles.

The exhibition highlighted the mutual cooperation between producing companies and the public sector to support the conversion process.

It also showcased the research and development programmes in the field and the steps the state has taken to establish the required infrastructure to serve vehicles running on natural gas.

'Emigration' Responds to Citizen's Request to Renew his Passport

The Ministry of Emigration received a letter from an Egyptian citizen residing in Saudi Arabia, in which he complains of the delay in issuing his passport, which makes his residence in the Kingdom is converse, due to the expiration of his residence period.

The citizen requested assistance in obtaining a new passport, amid the precautionary measures taken due to Coronavirus pandemic outbreak, and his inability to conduct any financial deal with any party.

The ministry immediately contacted with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, then the citizen's new passport was issued and sent to the Egyptian Consulate in Jeddah, and consequently the passport was handed over to the citizen so that he could complete his residence procedures.

President El-Sisi Sponsors 'Egypt Can with Industry' & 'Egypt Can with Investment' Continues Reaping Fruits

'Egypt Can with Industry' Conference has recently got the sponsorship of Mr. President AbdelFattah El-Sisi. It is organized by the Ministry of Emigration, in collaboration with Ministries of Trade, Military Production, Planning and Public Business Sector, as well as the Arab Organization for Industrialization.

H.E Minister of Emigration Nabila Makram affirmed that the President's sponsorship grants the conference more honor and confirms Egypt's desire to upgrade the industrial sector, adding that the President has always been keen to sponsor the previous five editions of the conference, within his government's mandate to link Egyptian experts to the homeland's issues.

In the same context, Makram participated in the opening of the Factory of the Egyptian-Chinese Company 'Good Sense Egypt', for manufacturing composite aluminum panels, located in Ataqa, Suez Governorate. General AbdelMaguid Saqr, Governor of Suez, invited the minister to promote more investments to the industrial zone in Suez, and pledged to support any investor, especially Egyptian expats who are willing to establish industrial projects in the governorate.

Moreover, and in the light of continuing to reap fruits of "Egypt Can with Investment and Development" conference, Mr. Ahmed Lotfy, an Egyptian businessman in UK, signed a contract with the Armed Forces Engineering Authority and the British Royal Society, to establish 3 training centers in the field of yachts. Similarly, Mr. Karam Khalil, an Egyptian businessman in USA, started to export products from Kunoz Factories for Marble and Granite, to Yemen, Emirates and Saudi Arabia.



Egypt's Police Day

The day January 25 marks a historic clash between Egyptian police forces and the British Occupation forces in 1952, which was called then "Ismailia Battle." It took place when the Egyptian police officers refused to hand over their weapons, and evacuate the Ismailia governorate's building. The incident left 50 martyrs and 80 injured among Egyptian police officers.

The massacre was the spark of the revolution that ended the monarchy in Egypt on July 23 of the same year.

Few months before the incident, the armed struggle against the British camps and soldiers culminated, resulting in huge losses. Suppliers abstained from providing food necessary to 80,000 British soldiers.

Egyptian workers at the British camps - whose number was 91,572 - quit their jobs, registering their resignations between October 16 and November 30 in 1951, after the government had announced earlier that workers wishing to leave their jobs in British camps are invited to register their names in the records, according to Al Masry Al Youm.

As the status of British forces in the Suez Canal governorates has become critical, Brigadier Kenneth Exham, the British commander warned Egypt's

police to leave Ismailia and surrender their weapons while 7,000 British soldiers equipped with machine guns, tanks and armors surrounded the governorate building and its barracks.

The nearly 800 Egyptian officers and soldiers inside resented the threat and resisted despite possessing only shotguns, according to Al Masry Al Youm. After the clashes were over, those who survived from the Egyptian officers were captured by the British forces; then the British forces destroyed the villages around Ismailia and killed civilians as the British suspected that the citizens engaged in the armed struggle against the colonization hid in those villages.

As a result, protests broke out across Cairo calling up for intensifying the armed struggle against the British colonization whose troops withdrew completely from Egypt in June 1956.

Since then, the day became a national day in Ismailia governorate. Former late President Mohamed Hosni Mubarak issued a decision to consider the day an official holiday 'Police Day' in February 2009, in appreciation to police efforts, and recognizing their sacrifices.
