

Subject: A Call to Action - Opportunities and Challenges from Your Constituents

On October 19, 2023, thousands of Central Floridians participated in a day of conversation called <u>TableTalk</u>, an initiative of our region's community foundation, <u>Central Florida Foundation</u>. In its 4th year, this unique experience consists of small group conversations that take place across Central Florida counties with topics based on the <u>Thrive Framework</u> focus areas. At its core, TableTalk is an exercise in civic engagement and solutions-based discussion that produces a <u>report</u> reflecting the current concerns and mindset of your constituents. Importantly, it showcases what's going right and what might need attention, which is what this letter is meant to share with you today.

The survey findings from Central Floridians paint an encouraging picture, with 76% showing a brighter outlook for the future. This boost in optimism stems from a shared commitment to unity, common objectives, and a growing awareness of community concerns. There's a noticeable drive to collaborate and adapt to inevitable changes, driven by a deep-seated passion for tackling significant social issues. Moreover, participants expressed contentment with local leadership and acknowledged the community's grasp of prevailing challenges. Nevertheless, obstacles like political discord, limited collaboration, and resource constraints persist. Despite these hurdles and the slow pace of progress, there's a palpable resolve to surmount challenges and pave the way for a more promising future.

The Questions

Table participants were asked 3 questions that were posed through the lens of their chosen Thrive Framework focus area.

What is going well in this space?


What are 2-3 challenges preventing more progress in this space? How can we take action to address one of these challenges?

Challenges and Opportunities

Some of the areas identified by the survey respondents mirror the findings of the Central Florida Community Landscape report with

Based on qualitative notes, these are the words we saw the most. top issues including economic stability which encompasses housing, transportation, and good jobs, healthcare, including mental health, and education.

Conversational Trends and Ideas

The following is a list of trends and ideas we saw from the conversations that were had in October. Some trends and ideas are broad and overarching; others are niche and specific. While we understand that not all of these topic areas can be implemented into specific action plans by city and county leaders, we wanted to share some recurring topics, and in some cases specific ideas, that were generated or discussed in the conversations. We've organized this list by Thrive Framework focus areas, however these ideas can overlap and integrate more than one area.

Economic Stability

Conversational Trends and Ideas

- Changing zoning to allow for different housing types
- Framing transportation for accessibility
- Universal basic income
- Empower more black businesses and entrepreneurs
- Job programs that also focus on personal growth
- Emergency drop-off centers for single parents who need to work on days when there are unplanned school closures or illness
- Peer support networks for single mothers
- Revitalizing abandoned buildings, land, and strip malls

Healthcare

Conversational Trends and Ideas

- Subsidized health insurance and other benefits through chambers of commerce
- More focus on healthy communities, eating right and nutrition in schools
- People who help connect others to social services and healthcare

Education

Conversational Trends and Ideas

- Expose more people to technology and innovation in an inclusive way
- Improved communications on public school offerings, including magnet schools
- Encourage parents who do not send their children to public schools to access educational diagnostic testing
- Encourage families to read, "even if it is just menus"
- Strengthen the reading gap in school by building a supportive alliance of reading organizations
- Establish book pal programs
- Improved communication about the public library system and its offerings

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Livability

Conversational Trends and Ideas

- Promote or establish art-based mobile projects in order to reach more neighborhoods and communities
- Promote positive news stories
- Use TDT taxes to improve access to arts, public spaces
- More neighborhood beautification, such as murals
- Community app with restaurants, theaters, museums and other local attractions for easier access to information
- More focus on solar panels and recycling
- Education and incentives for conserving energy
- Make mass transit more accessible and safe with walkable bus stops with lighting
- More trees in lower-income neighborhoods

Community & Social Connection

Conversational Trends and Ideas

- More places that encourage people to gather
- Create safe spaces for civil discourse
- Find ways to encourage more civic engagement, especially voting
- Build trust through communication
- Encourage voting and volunteering through public service announcements

TableTalk Microgrants

To help fuel any sparks of ideas that came out of October's conversations, Central Florida Foundation opened its annual TableTalk Microgrant program for any participants who felt they had a viable idea that would improve our region. If an individual had an idea that was selected for a grant but was not associated with a registered 501[c][3] organization, the Foundation successfully paired ideas with an aligned nonprofit. This year, \$30,000 in grants were awarded to Central Florida nonprofits through this initiative.

Ideas Fueled by a Microgrant

Here are a few of the ideas supported through this program.

- Monthly dinner discussion with members of different faiths to promote meaningful dialogue

- Program development for athletes with disabilities

- Development of a Habitat U Youth Summit to promote money management skills
 - Nonprofit: Habitat for Humanity Greater Orlando & Osceola County
- Creation of an LGBTQ Widow Support community
 - Nonprofit: Modern Widows Club, Inc.
