Stanley Nelson is an American documentary filmmaker and a MacArthur Fellow known as a director, writer and producer of documentaries examining African-American history and experiences. He is a recipient of the 2013 National Humanities Medal from President Obama. He has won three Primetime Emmy Awards. Nelson and his wife, Marcia A. Smith, formed the nonprofit documentary film production company Firelight Media, whose films include 2021 Oscar-nominated ATTICA and the critically acclaimed 2003 documentary entitled THE MURDER OF EMMETT TILL.




Marcia Smith is president and co-founder of Firelight Media, which produces documentary films, provides artistic and financial support to emerging filmmakers of color, and builds impact campaigns to connect documentaries to audiences and social justice advocates. Under her leadership, Firelight Media was honored with a MacArthur Award for Creative and Effective Institutions.



Derek M. Cianfrance is a director, cinematographer, screenwriter, and editor. He is best known for writing and directing the films BLUE VALENTINE, THE PLACE BEYOND THE PINES (filmed in Schenectady and Scotia); and THE LIGHT BETWEEN OCEANS as well as the HBO miniseries I KNOW THIS MUCH IS TRUE, starring Mark Ruffalo. For his contributions to the story of SOUND OF METAL, he received a nomination for the Academy Award for Best Original Screenplay with its director Darius Marder and Abraham Marder.

ALGREN

"Algren" spotlights the hard-knock life and authentic creative legacy of one of the most underrated writers of the twentieth century, Nelson Algren. Algren's brutally honest portrayal of the American underclass and his hard-nosed lifestyle became his pathway to compassion. Through interviews with Algren's contemporaries, experts, and "literary soulmates," as well as

through the photography of Algren's friends, Art Shay and Stephen Deutch, the film tells his story. It celebrates his tremendous contribution to and influence on American letters, and pushes Algren, champion of the marginalized, out from the margins.

Russell Banks is an American novelist known for his portrayals of the interior lives of characters at odds with economic and social forces. The internationally acclaimed author has published 21 works of fiction and non-fiction, including the novels Continental Drift, Rule of the Bone, The Book of Jamaica, Cloudsplitter, Lost Memory of Skin, and most recently, Foregone.

His work has been translated into more than 20 languages. Two of his novels, Affliction and The Sweet Hereafter, were made into award-winning feature films.

Michael Caplan is the writer and director of ALGREN, a documentary that details the life and legacy of American writer Nelson Algren. An independent film director, producer, and teacher, he is also an associate professor in the Cinema Art + Science Department at Columbia College Chicago.

His previous films include A MAGICAL VISION, a feature length documentary that spotlights Eugene Burger, a magician and guru of the magical arts, and STONES FROM THE SOIL, a documentary on his father that showed on national PBS in 2005.



A TREE. A ROCK. A CLOUD

Based on the short story by groundbreaking southern American writer Carson McCullers, written when she was just 25, the film, A TREE. A ROCK. A CLOUD. is set at a roadside café in the early morning in the spring of 1947. A young boy and an older man meet by chance. The man relates a luminous tale of personal heartbreak and loss, and of his hard-won understanding of the nature of love. The film is the directorial debut of award winning actor/director Karen Allen, who

starred in RAIDERS OF THE LOST ARK.


Karen Allen is presenting her directorial debut, the film short A TREE. A ROCK. A CLOUD. at the Albany Film Festival. Allen made her major film debut in 1978 in NATIONAL LAMPOON'S ANIMAL HOUSE. Her career-changing role came with the blockbuster movie RAIDERS OF THE LOST ARK (1981). She also appeared with Jeff Bridges in STARMAN (1984), and with John Malkovich and Joanne

Woodward in the Paul Newman-directed film version of THE GLASS MENAGERIE in 1987. Allen has a long-standing relationship with the Berkshire Theater Group and sits on the board of the Berkshire International Film Festival.

This powerful film was made to mark the 50th anniversary of the 1971 uprising at the Attica Correctional Facility in Attica, N.Y. The violent five-day standoff between mostly Black and Latino inmates and law enforcement gripped the American public and resulted in acrimonious

recrimination and protracted lawsuits. Drawing upon archival material and interviews with survivors, witnesses, and government officials, the documentary underscores an ongoing need for criminal justice reform and conversations about systemic racism.


Ironweed Award-winner, Stanley Nelson's newest film

Other recent films include CRACK: COCAINE, CORRUPTION & CONSPIRACY for Netflix; the Emmy-nominated TULSA BURNING: THE 1921 RACE MASSACRE for the History Channel; and MILES DAVIS: BIRTH OF THE COOL, which became Nelson's 10th Sundance Film Festival premiere and first Grammy nomination for Best Music Film in 2020.


Director: D.W. Young, USA | 2019 | 1 hr 39min Directed, edited, and produced by D.W. Young, THE BOOKSELLERS explores the world of antiquarian and rare book dealers and their bookstores. It focuses primarily on booksellers in New York City, including Adina Cohen, Naomi Hample and Judith Lowry, the three sisters of the Argosy Book Store; Stephen Massey, founder of Christie's NY Book Department; and Nancy Bass Wyden, owner of the Strand Bookstore.

Other prominent people featured in the film include Fran Lebowitz, Gay Talese, Justin Croft, Zack Hample, Susan Orlean, William S. Reese, A. S. W. Rosenbach, Jay S. Walker, and Kevin Young.

D.W. Young has directed 11 documentaries and short films and worked as editor on more than 50 films. His films have screened at festivals around the world including New York Film Festival, SXSW, Vancouver International Film Festival, Maryland Film Festival, and many more. His features include THE BOOKSELLERS (2019), THE HAPPY HOUSE (2013), NOT INTERESTED (2010), and A HOLE IN A FENCE (2008).

BRIDGING THE DIVIDE (WMHT)

BRIDGING THE DIVIDE documents the work of more than a dozen artists as they beautified Troy's Hoosick Street Bridge pillars with colorful murals. The film outlines the history of the neighborhood and business district that once stood where the bridge is today, while talking with residents who remember that neighborhood prior to the Collar

City Bridge opening in 1980. The documentary piece, Rafferty's debut full-length film as a producer with WMHT, also examines the future of this location in Troy as a public gathering space to unify the communities to the north and south of the bridge.

Catherine Rafferty is Education Producer at WMHT. Catherine produces short and long-form stories about the impact of education on students, parents and teachers in the Capital Region. She also shares curriculum developed by local educators on PBS LearningMedia.

She is the producer of BRIDGING THE DIVIDE, a multiplatform documentary project about how public art is bringing together a community divided in Troy, NY. Catherine has produced segments for the local story of PBS's Future of Work, WMHT's public affairs program New York NOW, and produced season 13 of WMHT's independent short film series, TVFilm. She graduated from Rochester Institute of Technology with a BFA in Photojournalism.


David Van Deusen served 38

CHOPPED LIVER is a series of comic shorts shot on vhs. Following in the tradition of CAROL BURNETT, MONTY PYTHON, and SATURDAY NIGHT LIVE, Shannon Plumb puts together a timely variety show. In the past Plumb has worked alone performing all her own characters. Now, in this episodic journey she explores the interactions of the comic duo. For the third episode of CHOPPED LIVER, Plumb invites Eva Mendes to play with her in this series of zany, surreal and poignant skits.

Shannon Plumb's cinematic studies of life's

various roles and characters explore the complexities embedded in the ordinary and extraordinary. From the humble persona of a new mother to iconic figures from the silver screen, Plumb

portrays these characters with zest and humor. Inspired by the curious spirit of slapstick comedy and the physical humor of silent film legends such as Buster Keaton and Charlie Chaplin, Plumb employs a low-fi aesthetic by using Super-8 film, stationary camera shots, long takes and hand-

made props and costumes. Plumb is a one-woman show starring as all characters and acting as the creative force behind her films. The low-quality production of the films and her elastic expressiveness as an actress adds to the charm of her work and pushes it beyond its obvious predecessors and influences.

FILMS MADE IN THE CAPITAL REGION

Join C.J. Lais, Jackson Murphy and Jim Dixon as they discuss how films are being made in the Capital Region and why this area has become a favorite spot for the film industry.

C.J. Lais Jr., a lifelong Capital Region resident, has been obsessed with movies practically since birth, and has been writing about them for the *Times Union* for more than 20 years. He also compiles the weekly movie quiz in the newspaper's *Preview* section. A Troy native, Lais took film classes as a UAlbany undergrad; counts Meryl Streep and Jack Nicholson among his past co-stars (he worked five days as an extra on IRONWEED): and once sat next to Peter Bogdanovich at a

local screening. Currently, Lais can be seen boring his two daughters with endless film trivia and trying to get them to watch movies on his "essentials" list.

Jackson Murphy (a.k.a. Lights-Camera-Jackson) began his career as a movie critic at the age of 7 1/2. He made his first national TV appearance in the summer of 2009, interviewed from the audience on "Live with Regis and Kelly." Jackson won his first NY Emmy Award in 2010, becoming the youngest winner in the 53 years of that award. In 2012 he became the youngest member of the Broadcast Film

Critics Association and he appeared on the BFCA's "Critics Choice Movie Awards" in Jan. 2013. He is the film critic for 99.5 The River (Albany, NY) and www.cultjer.com, and is the lead writer for AnimationScoop.com.

Learn what it's like to be a location manager and production designer for a hit HBO show.


Michael Connors was the assistant location manager for nine episodes of HBO's THE GILDED AGE. He previously worked as assistant location manager on THE UNDOING starring Nicole Kidman and Hugh Grant, ORANGE IS THE NEW BLACK, ELEMENTARY, THE BLACKLIST and several other television series.

Lauri Pitkus is a freelance, NY-based location manager currently working on season 2 of the HBO series, THE GILDED AGE. She loves working with directors, production designers, writers and cinematographers, translating their vision and ideas to practical locations. Her TV credits include HBO's THE UNDOING, the Netflix series, ORANGE IS THE NEW BLACK and the Showtime series, NURSE JACKIE. Feature Film credits include THE GOLDFINCH, THE POST, OCEANS

8, DRAFT DAY, OBLIVION, THE BOURNE ULTIMATUM, BURN AFTER READING, AND GHOST. After more than 25 years of not sitting behind a desk, she is decidedly feral.

Bob Shaw served as production designer for HBO's THE GILDED AGE. He was nominated for an Oscar for Best Achievement in Production Design for his work on THE IRISHMAN (2019) and won Primetime Emmy Awards for Outstanding Art Direction for a Single-Camera Series for both BOARDWALK EMPIRE (2010), and MAD MEN (2007), and nominated for the award three times (2000, 2001, 2004) of the investigation of the company of the series of the series

for his work on THE SOPRANOS. His credits also include THE MANY SAINTS OF NEWARK (2021), THE WOLF OF WALL STREET (2013), PAN AM (2011), DIEHARD WITH A VENGEANCE (1995), ROBOCOP 3 (1993).



THE HARD PLACES

THE HARD PLACES is a documentary profiling the powerful story of Dr. Tom Little, who spent over 30 years providing eye care in Afghanistan. He and his family lived through the Soviet invasion, civil war, Islamic extremism, and the U.S. occupation after 9/11. Despite the constant dangers, Dr. Little refused to leave and as a result

had a profound impact on the lives of thousands of people. On August 5th 2010, as Little and his team were returning to Kabul from a remote eye camp in the Afghan wilderness they were ambushed and killed.

Daniel Swinton is a multiple Emmy award-winning visual communicator and documentary veteran. He formerly served as the Director of Production & Content for Mountain Lake PBS and Vice President, Production at WMHT-PBS in North Greenbush, NY where he produced numerous award-winning documentaries, television series and original multi-platform content including the Emmy-Award winning SONGS TO KEEP: TREASURES OF AN ADIRONDACK FOLK

COLLECTOR and William Kennedy's PROHIBITION STORY. Other recent works include the Emmy-award winning travelogue series BREWED IN NEW YORK, and the short documentary WILLIAM WARFIELD: CAST IN HISTORY. As a filmmaker his work conveys a sensitivity toward subjects whose lives have taken unorthodox paths and invites the viewer to engage with the unknown in ways that may challenge personal preconceptions.


Based on the bestselling novel by Wally Lamb, written and directed by Derek Cianfrance, and starring Mark Ruffalo, this limited series follows Dominick Birdsey as he struggles to care for his mentally ill twin brother, Thomas, while discovering the truth about his own family history. Ruffalo won a Primetime Emmy Award and a Golden Globe for best actor for his role, aired on HBO and shot partly in Ulster and Dutchess counties.

Wally Lamb is the author of six New York Times best-selling novels: I'll Take You There, We Are Water, Wishin' and Hopin', The Hour I First Believed, I Know This Much is True, and She's Come Undone, and was twice selected for Oprah's Book Club. Lamb also edited Couldn't Keep It to Myself and I'll Fly Away, two volumes of essays from students in his writing workshop at York Correctional Institution, a women's prison in Connecticut, where he volunteered for 20 years.

In May of 2020, I KNOW THIS MUCH IS TRUE premiered on HBO as a limited series based on the novel.

THE MENTAL STATE

Upstate New York Premiere. Based on the play of the same name by Josh Adell, THE MENTAL STATE tells the story of a working class mother (Carly Pope) struggling to save her troubled teenage son (Jance Enslin) who continues to cope with the suicide of his veteran father (Bryan Greenberg). The film explores the human story behind the news reports and asks how we as a national community can address the urgent issues

of teenage mental illness and school shootings. "It is our sincere hope that the film will spur an open national dialogue regarding the stigma surrounding mental health and gun violence in schools," said director James Camali. THE MENTAL STATE was produced by Matt Einstein, Ronnee Swenton, and UAlbany alumnus Glen Trotiner.

James Camali is a director, editor, and photographer. He was an architecture student at Roger Williams University, but after a year he transferred to the School of Visual Arts to pursue his childhood dream of becoming a filmmaker. His shorts and films include GARY (2015), A FATAL OBSESSION (2015), THE LENNON REPORT (2016) and his new feature film THE MENTAL STATE set to enter the 2021-22 festival circuit.

Glen Trotiner, film producer, writer, and director, holds bachelor's and master's degrees from UAlbany. His film career began as a Directors Guild of America trainee on Sidney Lumet's POWER and shortly thereafter as second assistant director on Brian De Palma's THE UNTOUCHABLES. Trotiner serves on the board of trustees of the Directors Guild of America Training Program, the very apprenticeship program which launched his career in the motion picture

industry. He has helped produce dozens of movies, including THE GIANT MECHANICAL MAN, BELLA, BERNARD AND DORIS, FAM-I-LY, which premiered at South by Southwest; and BIG TIME ADOLESENCE (which premiered in competition at this year's Sundance Film Festival.

The Cuban-American writer and director Hugo Pérez's documentary OMARA looks at the life of Cuban singer Omara Portuondo. It tells the story of Omara's seven decades-long career for the first time, and how she became a trailblazing single mother and advocate for Afro-Cuban women, already an icon before ever joining the

highly successful Buena Vista Social Club.


Hugo Pérez is an award-winning documentary filmmaker, whose

films often focus on his Cuban-American heritage and the systematic oppression of marginalized people. He was the recipient of the 2009 Estela Award for Documentary Filmmaking presented by the National Association of Latino Independent Producers, and his work has frequently appeared on PBS and in film festivals. His writing has been featured in the New York Times Magazine and Salon, and his films have screened at venues such as MoMA and the

Smithsonian. Perez is the founder of M30A Films. Earlier in his career, Pérez was the NYS Writers Institute videographer and director of its WMHT television series, "The Writer."

THE TRIAL OF THE CHICAGO 7

Based on *The Trial of the Chicago 7: The Official Transcript*, co-edited by George McNamee, the film, written and directed by Aaron Sorkin, follows the notorious court case of the Chicago 7, a group of anti-Vietnam War protesters charged with conspiracy and crossing state lines with the intention of inciting riots at the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago. It features an ensemble cast including Yahya Abdul-Mateen II, Sacha Baron Cohen, Joseph Gordon-Levitt, Michael Keaton, Frank Langella, John Carroll Lynch, Eddie Redmayne, Mark

Rylance, Jeremy Strong, and Ben Shenkman.

George McNamee conceived and co-authored the Tales of Hoffman, recently reissued as the Trial of the Chicago 7, which sold over 200,0000 copies, and served as the basis for the 2020 film written and directed by Aaron Sorkin. He is chairman of Plug Power, the leading producer of hydrogen fuel cells supplying early adopters including Amazon, Walmart and Home Depot.

Florida, on February 14, 2018. The film had
its world premiere at the 2020 Sundance Film
Festival on January 25, 2020. Samantha Fuentes

is a survivor of the Parkland shooting.

Samantha Fuentes was wounded during a school shooting at the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, on February 14, 2018. Seventeen people were killed during that senseless act of gun violence. She has bullet shrapnel permanently embedded in her legs and behind her right eye, and currently manages symptoms of Post-Traumatic

Stress Disorder (PTSD). She frequently speaks about her life experiences and works closely with Angel Faces, an organization that serves girls who have endured all types of trauma.

Kim A. Snyder's most recent feature documentary, US KIDS, premiered in the U.S. Documentary Competition at the 2020 Sundance Film Festival. Prior, she directed the Peabody award-winning documentary NEWTOWN, which premiered in the US Competition at the 2016 Sundance Film Festival. Her most recent short, LESSONS FROM A SCHOOL SHOOTING: NOTES FROM DUNBLANE, premiered at the

2018 Tribeca Film Festival and was awarded Best Documentary Short. Snyder's prior works include the feature documentary, WELCOME TO SHELBYVILLE, and over a dozen short documentaries. Her award-winning directorial debut feature documentary, I REMEMBER ME, was theatrically distributed by Zeitgeist Films. In 1994, she associate-produced the Academy Award-winning short film TREVOR.

Kennedy holds a Bachelor's degree in Human Development, a Master's in Community Psychology and has completed extensive specialized training in creative action methods with individuals and groups.



D. Colin (WHITEWASHED: THE RACISM PROJECT) is a poet, performer, visual artist, and educator living in Troy, NY. She is the author of two poetry collections, *Dreaming in Kreyol* and *Said the Swing to the Hoop*. She is also a Cave Canem, VONA and New York State Writers Institute fellow.






