### A Reflection from Fr. Paul

Our parish provides copies of "Little Books" from the Diocese of Saginaw to parishioners for Advent/ Christmas, Lent, and Eastertime. I was struck by a statement in the selection for December 31<sup>st</sup>: reading scripture is not simply information. It is formation – God is shaping our thoughts and feelings through these words.

Formation vs. information: I had never thought of it that way before, but it makes a lot of sense. If we are reading something for "information," we want to be "informed," we want to learn something. So, when I get a new gadget, I read the manual for information, that is, to learn something. It is very much in my head. I read a newspaper to be informed about what is happening in the world.

The danger of reading the Gospels that way is that we might think we "know" what the scripture passage is about. For example, I have read the story of the annunciation so many times that I could almost recite it by heart. In terms of information, there isn't much more I can learn. I can breeze through it, without much impact on my life.

When I read for FORMATION, I am not looking to learn information, but rather reflecting on what the passage is challenging me to here and now, at this moment in my life. It is reflecting in silence, giving the Holy Spirit time and space to move my heart so that I can LIVE what I am reading. It is not simply gathering information: it is allowing what I read to FORM me as a disciple of Christ.

I invite us to consciously approach the Gospels we read and hear as a FORMATION opportunity, challenging us to grow as disciples of Christ, who bring His love and compassion to those around us.

### Parish Updates from Fr. Paul

#### **Love One Another Capital Campaign**

As I have announced before, our parish, along with 188 other parishes in the diocese, is participating in the Love One Another capital campaign. You should have recently received a letter from Archbishop Listecki announcing the campaign.

Sixty percent of the money raised will remain in the parish, forty percent will go to support diocesan initiatives. Our request to build a gathering space in the back of church with our portion of the funds was denied by the diocese for fear that the remaining worship space would be too small for future growth. Following the diocesan directives, our parish leadership has determined that the funds remaining in the parish will be used in two different areas: evangelization and facility improvement. More details will be shared as they are finalized.

Note: the annual Catholic Stewardship Appeal, which will start up February 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> for 2023, supports day-to-day operating expenses of the diocese. The Love One Another Campaign will support extraordinary expenses. Both are important.

You will eventually be contacted and invited to participate in the Love One Another campaign. Please keep the success of this campaign in your prayers.

#### **Guard your personal belongings**

We have been informed by the diocese that there have been incidents in a number of parishes where someone has stolen purses left in the pews while the person went to communion. We like to think we are safe in church, but there are people who come to services, not to worship, but to steal. Please always keep your belongings with you.

Parishioner Sue Haertel will visit the parish this summer while she is in Tanzania, discussing ways we can make this relationship two way, in addition to praying for each other. She will also bring materials to begin developing a display in the sister parish alcove in the back of the church. Please keep both our former and our new sister parish in your prayers.

#### **Finances**

If you follow along in the bulletin you've noticed that stewardship giving is on pace to the budget for the first seven months of the accounting year! Expenses are also in check with the budget, which is balanced this year, meaning it projects income sufficient to cover the operating expenses. However, it also does not project any surplus. Assuming things continue at this pace for both income and expenses, we shouldn't have to dip into savings to pay operating expenses for this fiscal year (ending June 30<sup>th</sup>).

#### Stewardship Campaign

As we wrap up our annual financial stewardship pledge drive I share the following:

- 209 of our 416 registered families (50+%) have submitted a pledge and/or are committed to monthly/ weekly electronic giving (EFT/Vanco).
- An additional 48 families that contributed in 2022 have not submitted a pledge for 2023. I ask once more, that if you fall in this category, we would still like to hear from you (send in your pledge card, pledge online at bit.ly/2023Pius, or contact me).
- Analyzing this data of pledges in hand and the known giving patterns of others allows us to project a reliable "total parishioner stewardship value" for next year's operating budget. As of now it appears that value will exceed this year's budget by 1-3%. This may not be enough to cover increasing utility and operating expenses.

#### Miscellaneous

The year-end tax letters acknowledging your 2022 donations to the parish went out on January 18<sup>th</sup>. Please call me if you have not received your letter in the mail or if there is an error.

FYI: 42% of our donating families now utilize electronic funds transfer (EFT) and/or the (Vanco) online giving tool for their stewardship giving. This is a safe and easy way to donate. For more information, feel free to call me or visit <a href="mailto:bit.ly/donate2pius">bit.ly/donate2pius</a>.

Once or twice a year I like to promote the use of the brown "TAKE PRIDE IN PIUS!" (B&G Fund) envelopes. Monies that come in this way, separate from your stewardship giving, are put aside to a specially designated fund used to cover unplanned repairs or improvements to the buildings and grounds not provided for in the operating budget. Examples include: sidewalk repairs, a blown hot water heater, meeting room/office updates (paint/flooring/ceiling tiles), security system, choir railings, and gym/school updates. It's so helpful to have this little "piggy bank" when the need arises! Every dollar helps! If you don't have the special envelope, and would like to donate, write "B&G Fund" on a plain envelope and/or the check memo line.

### **Faith Formation**

# Interested in Respite Care Provider Training (RCPT)?

The Respite Care Provider Training (RCPT) is a series of free courses for anyone interested in providing respite care as a career, a part-time job, or even a volunteer activity to individuals with varying disabilities and ages. Learners can work at their own pace to complete the ten required online courses, stopping and starting as needed. No experience is necessary, anyone can learn. See what's included and take the program free.

When you have finished the RCPT, you'll receive a certificate of completion for seven hours. You will be offered the opportunity to be added to the Wisconsin Respite Care Registry (<a href="https://respitecarewi.org/registry">https://respitecarewi.org/registry</a>), available to primary caregivers to search for respite care providers in their community. Take a look for it the next time you come to Mass. You never know when you may need to use this lifesaving equipment.





### **Wauwatosa Catholic School**

Happy New Year! 2023 started with a flurry of activities at Wauwatosa Catholic.

Here's what's happening in some of our classes:

- The young learners in K4 are showing an interest in and readiness for reading their first book!
- Students in first grade presented their "Homes Around the World" project in which they chose a location, researched its geographical features, determined what type of home would be best to build in that environment and then built a model of it.
- Our fourth graders are learning about the history of immigration in the United States, and studying what is required to become a citizen.
- The sixth graders are working on their country project. They have been researching various aspects of a country they chose and will present their projects in early March.

Our Awards Program in January celebrated the attribute "principled". It was wonderful to talk to the students about the word principled and what it means. Even our very youngest students know that doing the right thing isn't always easy. The words of the teachers as they nominated their student of the month were amazing. Our young people know what it means and truly try to act in a principled, caring manner.

Catholic Schools Week began on Sunday, January 29th and students took part in the 10:30 am Mass at St. Pius X. They eagerly volunteered to lector and read petitions during that Mass. WCS hosted an Open House later that day where parents, students and staff members were on hand to talk to prospective members of our Wauwatosa Catholic School family. One thing that was stressed was that along with the faith-based academics, WCS is a community of caring people, truly a family!

Every day of Catholic Schools Week had a different theme. Monday was our International Day. Parents and community members talked to different classes about their ethnicity, where their family originated and family traditions. We had speakers with family ties to Southeast Asia, Croatia, Africa, Germany, South America. Fr. Paul shared some experiences from his time in Mexico and other countries. We ended the day with a presentation by the Hmong Dance Team, from the Hmong American Friendship Association. On Tuesday, students wore their pajamas to school and on Wednesday, to celebrate our nation, students wore red, white and blue. Thursday was spirit wear day and the annual staff/student volleyball game. The week ended with students celebrating vocations on Friday. Family and community members volunteered to speak to students about their vocation/career. Students dressed as they would in their future careers.

### **Stewardship Commission**

This month, James, the president of Safe Water for Life & Dignity (SWLD), has written to us about a project that provided a better water supply to a Salvatorian Community in Tanzania:

A few weeks ago, SWLD constructed a borehole at the Salvatorian community in Bigwa Mitimitatu, Morogoro. This community had been experiencing an acute shortage of water, which made the lives of our SDS brothers very difficult. Their former sources of water included the municipal water supply and an old shallow well both of which were not sufficient and reliable. The shallow well was dry due to drought and the change of the underground aquifer formation. The municipal water supply was under intense rationing due to the fact that there was a sharp decrease of water volume at the municipal water intake and their various other sources were completely dry.

In our conversation with the Tanzania Pro-province administration and the Mission director, Fr. Tigatiga, we agreed that this community was in urgent need of water. SWLD embarked on the project after receiving the living water funds. The works included hydrogeological survey to determine the availability of water and depth; securing of drilling permit from the Wami basin authority; drilling of a borehole, pvc and gravel pack installation.





We drilled a 100 meter deep well with a very good yield of water. After successfully completion of drilling and PVC installation we installed a submersible pump, connected the water pipe to the existing raiser and water tank available at Mitimitatu community. Currently, water is now available at the community and can be used for domestic purposes, gardening and supporting other economic activities to generate income and livelihood.

We are also planning to increase the height of the existing tank raiser to increase the flowing of water in the houses at the community.

Many thanks to you all at St. Pius X and the living water project for the donation and improving the lives of our fellow brothers at SDS Mitimitatu community.
