NAYOMI MUNAWEERA

Nayomi Munaweera was born in Sri Lanka, grew up in Nigeria, and immigrated to Los Angeles with her family in the 1980s. She now lives in Oakland and holds writing workshops in Sri Lanka through a program called Write to Reconcile, as well as teaching at the Ashland University low-residency MFA program.

VIET THANH NGUYEN

Viet Thanh Nguyen was born in Ban Mê Thuôt (now spelled Buôn Mê Thuôt), Vietnam, and came to the United States as a refugee in 1975. His novel *The Sympathizer* won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction. He is a University Professor, the Aerol Arnold Chair of English, and a professor of English, American studies and ethnicity, and comparative literature at USC. *The Sympathizer* is being adapted as a TV series by HBO.

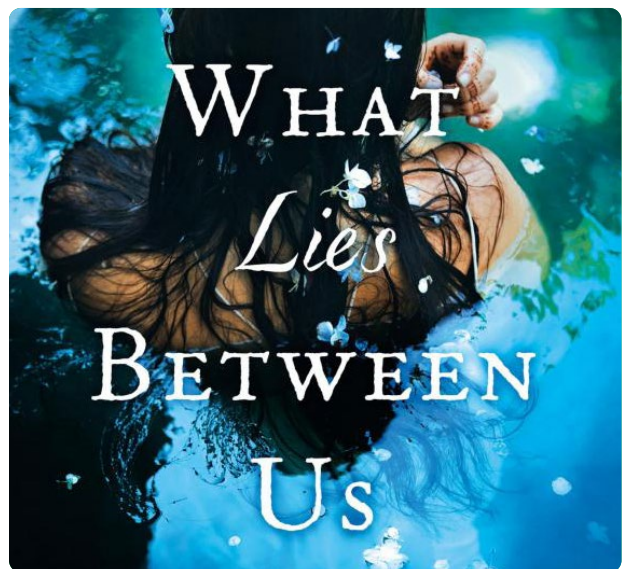

WARS ARE DISPLACING MILLIONS

According to the UN Refugee Agency, the world is currently experiencing the highest levels of displacement on record. As of May 2022, 100 million people were forcibly displaced as a result of persecution, conflict, violence, or human rights violations. This includes more than 10 million people displaced in just the prior year, as a result of the war in Ukraine and other conflicts.

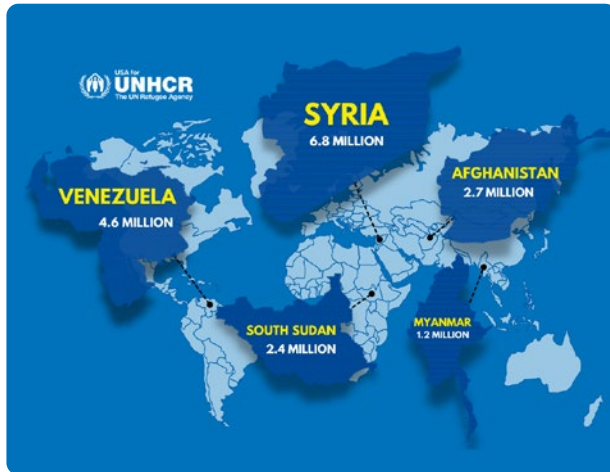


Viet Thanh Nguyen: *The Committed* (2021)



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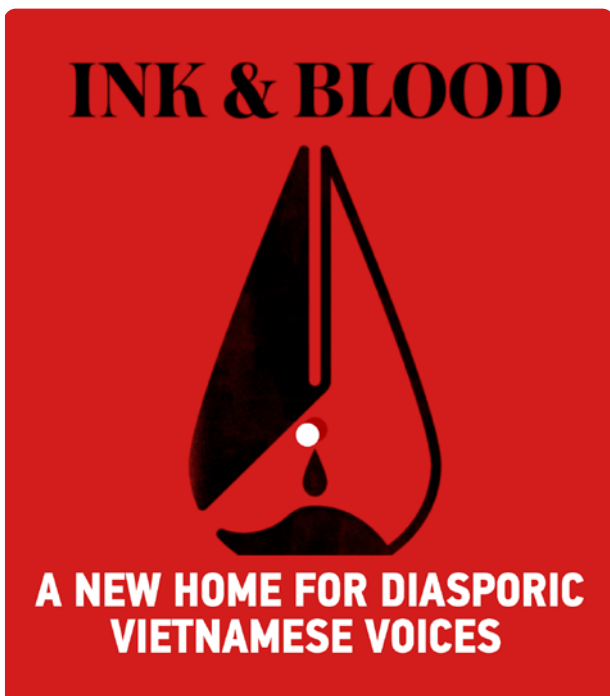

KAYA PRESS

Kaya Press publishes literature created throughout the Asian and Pacific Island diasporas. The press was founded in 1994 and publishes poetry, fiction, memoir, art, and more. Originally based in New York, Kaya Press is now housed in the Department of American Studies and Ethnicity at USC.

Kaya was the name of a tribal confederation of six Korean city-states that existed from the middle of the first until the sixth century CE. It is remembered as a utopia of learning, music, and the arts due to its trade and communication with China, Japan, and India.

INK & BLOOD

Ink & Blood is a joint imprint from Kaya Press and the Diasporic Vietnamese Artist Network (DVAN) that aims to bring Vietnamese literary voices from across the globe to English readers. *The Girl Before Her* by Line Papin is the first book on the Ink & Blood imprint.

- What books have affected your understanding of war? Of migration or diasporic experiences?

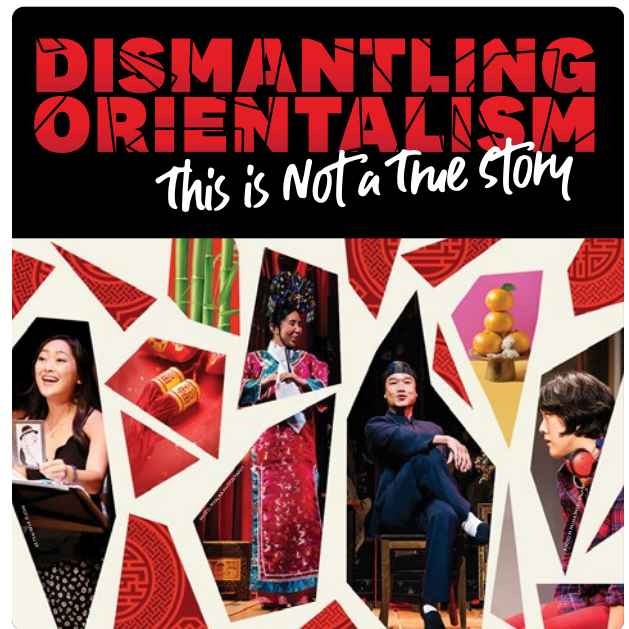

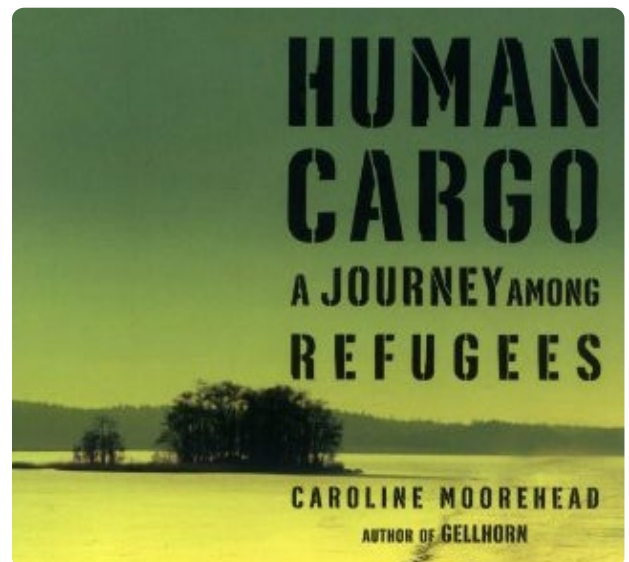

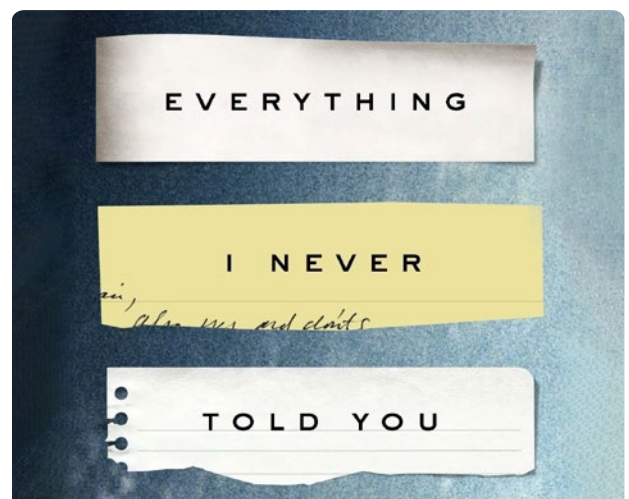
