D2L to Allow Negative Grading in Quizzes

The question of negative grading has been a thorn in the side of academia for decades. Negative grading penalizes test takers for incorrect answers; as such, it discourages guessing. Proponents say it encourages preparation and understanding, emphasizes accuracy, and prepares students for the real-world. Opponents point out that it may reduce students' motivation, increase anxiety, discourage risk-taking, and does not necessarily reflect true understanding.

D2L is agnostic on the issue, and as of the last update, offers the opportunity for instructors to incorporate negative grading. When enabled by the instructor, a quiz can deduct a percentage of a question's point value for incorrect answers submitted. This feature applies specifically to question types that can be autograded, for example, multiple-choice and true or false questions. The only question type that can't be auto-graded is written response.

Deduct points for incorrect answers

To ensure that learners are fully aware that negative marking is enabled for a quiz, the Summary page of a quiz explicitly notifies the learner that for each question answered incorrectly, a percentage of that question's point value is deducted from the final attempt grade. SoftChalk Migration

LSC will soon be moving SoftChalk Cloud to our own enterprise environment, which will utilize single sign-on for



easier login and provide us unlimited licenses. All faculty SoftChalk accounts and all existing SoftChalk content will be migrated to this new environment.

For faculty who use SoftChalk Cloud, you will no longer need a separate login and password for SoftChalk. However, you will need to update **all** D2L links to your SoftChalk lessons once the migration is complete, as the old links will no longer function after the update. This includes links copied over from a previous semester.

The migration will be taking place December 14th-19th; during that time, SoftChalk will be unavailable. Once the migration is complete, you will need to go through the process of updating your SoftChalk links for the new environment.

Copy Announcements

Have you ever made a course announcement that also needed to be in other courses you were teaching? In the past, you would likely copy the text from the first course, go to the destination course, start an announcement, and paste in the content. A new <u>Announcements</u> feature streamlines that process. Now, in the original course, you will have the option to Copy to Other Courses.

Copy to Other Courses

Once copied, the announcement is in a draft state and you must publish the copied announcement in the destination course to complete the copying process. The new feature copies everything about the announcement except for Release Conditions, if any.

Another recently added feature is the ability to <u>Pin Announcements</u> to the top of the Announcements list, thus allowing important information to remain visible to your students.
