Mr Kurt Herzog - Class of 2010

Since graduating from Oakhill, I've had many different experiences. Most people in high school knew me as one of the 'Herzog twins,' and I spent a lot of time after school trying to make the Australian Swim Team.

Luckily, I was able to represent my country at the 2015 Fina World Championships and earn a Bronze Medal in the 4 x 200 Freestyle Relay. The following year, I participated in various World Cup meets before narrowly missing out on qualifying for the 2016 Olympics by 0.2 seconds. A week after that, I had the first of two surgeries I needed for my shoulder, ending my professional swimming career. During this time, I was grateful to have completed a degree in Sports Management.

I remember my Oakhill teacher, Mr Robert Munday (the best Geography teacher in the world), always telling us that it's essential to have a backup plan, and that advice proved to be valuable. Since finishing my degree, I've worked for The Australian Paralympic Committee, NSW Institute of Sport, the Australian Sports Anti-Doping Authority (now known as Sport Integrity Australia SIA), run my own Swim Clinic business, and been the Australian Brand Manager for a swimwear brand, Arena.

After my swimming career ended, I felt a strong desire to give back to my country. After hearing some negative news in the media, I was curious to learn more about remote indigenous communities. I reached out to a non-profit organisation and began volunteering in various communities. During this time, I noticed that these communities lacked access to swimming pools, learn-to-swim programs, and teachers, and that employment rates were as low as 30%. None of this made sense to me, and it weighed heavily on my mind while living in Sydney. One day, I decided to drop everything and move to a tiny town called Ujtu, which is 2.5 hours west of Alice Springs, to do something about it. Since 2019, I have been living on and off in Utju, where I work as a lifeguard at the local community pool, serving a population of 150 indigenous people. My initial goal was to observe and learn, as life in remote communities vastly differs from what I was used to, with its rich culture and complex issues.





Before I could create ideas for improvement, I needed to subconsciously detach from everything I thought I knew was right in our white culture and start fresh by learning about the culture, cultural law, how these kids learn, the challenges the community faced, what they enjoyed, and what they didn't. Essentially, I needed to get to know them and what they wanted. During my first few seasons there, I realised that swimming pools were much more than a place for the community to learn how to swim. In my opinion, they are an essential component that contributes to a stronger and healthier community. Aboriginal people in remote communities have some of the highest prevalence of skin, ear, and eye infections worldwide, which is not a well-known fact. Studies have shown that swimming pools can reduce these infections. Additionally, when pools are open, crime rates go down because they provide a positive and safe space for the community to come together, socialise, and be physically active on relentless 47-degree days in the desert. Pools also help teach kids how to swim in a safe environment, where they are three times less likely to drown, and also provide employment opportunities in communities.

After two years of learning, I drafted a not-for-profit label for the Indigenous Swimming Foundation that set out to provide consistent swim and survival lessons and to create a pathway for local community members to attain qualifications to work at their local swimming pool and help keep it open all summer long. During this time however the YMCA created a similar concept and got in touch, hearing about my time in community. I jumped on board as they had the immediate funding to make it work and so here I am! I now help manage the YMCA's Remote Pools Project that aims to tackle health inequality across some of Central Australia's remote communities by keeping pools open. My goal is to create consistent programming to reduce drownings, reduce skin, ear and eye infections, and provide a pathway for employment for these pools to eventually be fully community run by local indigenous staff. Ms Alice Hann - Class of 2008

My journey as a Lasallian began when I came to Oakhill College in Year 11. It was probably even earlier as my Mum, or as my Year 11s tell me, "The real Mrs Hann" taught at Oakhill, well before my time here.

When I completed Year 12 at Oakhill, I took a leap and applied for a Lasallian Volunteer Trip to a tiny community in Western Australia called Balgo. And as the locals describe it, "it's a little bit long way".

After a 10 hour drive up the corrugated Tanami track, we arrived in a tiny little community. The community surrounds a red dirt AFL field and is situated on Kukatja, Walmatjarri, and Warlpiri Land.

On a normal day, the population would be around 400 people. In saying that, there's rarely a normal day.

Balgo Community has one shop, a school, a clinic and a church.



Here the De La Salle Brothers serve the community by providing education for the beautiful kids at Luurnpa Catholic School.

In the short two week trip, I absolutely fell in love with the children, the elders and the beautiful surroundings. I went on to do two more volunteer trips after this, and on my 2015 visit, something changed within me. I wanted to strive for better. I wanted to use my passion for teaching and children somewhere it was truly needed.

2016 came around, and I'd been given the opportunity of a lifetime. To teach in Balgo at Luurnpa Catholic School. But it was way more

I lived with and learned from the Kukatja People, where the culture and language were still so rich and where the land was untouched.

I experienced cultural ceremonies and women's initiation, Saturday night Masses with the elders and hunting trips for goanna, bush turkey, snakes or frogs. Things that so many people would never experience in their lifetime.

Most afternoons we'd sit at the lookout to watch the sun go down and on Sundays, we'd chase wild brumbies on our dirt bikes.

I lived out there for close to three years. I became part of the community. I learned enough of the language to know when the kids were teasing each other (or me). And most importantly, I felt at home.

Among the incredible highs, living in one of the most remote communities in Australia came with many challenges. One of these challenges was the irregular attendance of the children in school. The children fought through a lot of hardship every day, to show up to school and strive for excellence.

I'll use my little friend Delilah as an example. When I arrived to teach there, Delilah was completely disinterested in school and ran away back to her home every day. Fast forward to my last few weeks there, and I was waving goodbye to her as she got on a tiny plane to head off to boarding school in Perth. I saw a photo of Delilah the other day at her Graduation Ceremony, having completed Year 12. Proud is an understatement.

Some of the children make it to boarding school, but very few complete high school.

When the only proper high school is 2,000 kms away from your family and culture, when you're learning in your second and third language and you're sitting in a classroom learning the 'katiya' or the white way, it is a very difficult task.

We forget how fortunate we are to put on a clean school uniform every morning, come to school on a full stomach, and go home every night to a warm bed. We forget how privileged we are, to come to such an amazing College with teachers who truly care and so many opportunities for us all.

For the children of Balgo, some of these basic things were a privilege.

I wouldn't have had the opportunity if it weren't for being Lasallian or coming to Oakhill. Something so small as a two week trip turned into an incredible connection with such a special place that I've been a part of for over 10 years now.

When my time living there came to an end, the elders told me that the Luurnpa (the magical kingfisher) would be watching over me, and that he would bring me back one day.

This year I was so lucky to have landed the opportunity to come back and teach at Oakhill College. I aim to keep giving back to the Lasallian community in every way I can.

I noticed a banner the other day here at the College, that sums up my journey in a few words. That is "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve".

During Lent, we are called to reflect deeply on our journey so far and on our path ahead. This is a time for us to look within, look up, and strive for excellence. Our challenge is to find a way to give back.

There is something so special about being Lasallian and having somewhere to call home in different parts of the country and world.

I remind my students, to treasure your time here knowing how truly privileged you are and leave to serve those who aren't as lucky.

Opening of the state-of-the-art Innovation Hub.

Equipped with cutting-edge technology, the Innovation Hub will transform the way students learn, with advanced TAS (hybrid timber, fabrication, robotics, computer, graphics), Science and laboratory spaces. Despite the challenges presented by COVID and wet weather, the Innovation Hub is a testament to the hard work and vision of the College Board and Senior Leadership Team. It is a passive build that harmoniously integrates with the environment, has the highest sustainability rating, and reduces our carbon footprint. The use of timber provides natural heating and cooling, blending seamlessly into the landscape, and the feature curtain wall boasts advanced technology for clarity.

Oakhill College's focus from the beginning was to create innovative spaces that inspire and connect students. The building's opening was a star-studded event with dignitaries such as Her Excellency Margaret Beazley AC KC, the Governor of NSW, in attendance. Her Excellency highlighted the De La Salle Brothers' significant contribution to education worldwide and the importance of the holistic education that Oakhill College provides.

The day started with a smoking ceremony and blessing of the building before dignitaries addressed the attendees, followed by a tour of the Innovation Hub. We are grateful for the collaboration and support of our partners, including FDC, MostynCopper, BVN, Urbis, Viridi, and DCWC, for creating this remarkable space.

Oakhill College's Master Plan is ongoing with the next two stages the Canteen and The Commons already in progress. The construction of the Canteen, has been thoughtfully designed and easily accessible to all students on campus. Covering an area of 120m2, the Canteen will provide a modern and comfortable space for students, complete with an outdoor cafe area and seating, and is due for completion by September 2023. The Commons will serve as the administrative hub of the College, housing Pastoral and Curriculum services. This contemporary, three-level project features versatile design elements that can be adapted to the ever-evolving work environment, including offices and collaborative meeting rooms on Levels 1 and 2. On Level 3, a dynamic function space will be able to accommodate large groups of approximately 300 people.

The Commons will also feature an air bridge linking to the Adrian Building for easy access in addition to disability access to the Adrian Building. The extension of Oakhill Drive will run between the Canteen and The Commons, improving pedestrian flow. Additionally, The Commons will provide an outdoor area with tiered seating that can accommodate more than 300 people, which will be perfect for extended drama, performances, and/or Cohort and House meetings.

Oakhill College's Master Plan is not only about designing buildings, but a design intent, with respect to the site, it's history and legacy, sustainability and connectivity. The College Master Plan provides for innovative learning spaces that inspire; building connectivity for both teacher and student, and also student and space.


Duke of Edinburgh (DOE)

At the time I walked down the drive, I had no clear direction for my future, but knew that I wanted to pursue a career in medicine, social services, or perhaps even become a firefighter.



Overall, the reunion was filled with fond memories and great fun for all who attended.




Class of 2002 ★ 20-YEAR REUNION
